Mr. Joseph: Two changes. We want to add as item 7a Liquor Permit Request and we want to remove item 12a, which was held in committee.

Community Comments and Requests

Mr. Brusk: Norman Brusk, 1861 Crosswig Court. And I come to you with a complaint that I've had for last year and the year before. The year before that, the year before that. And that is the unauthorized yard signs that are put up by commercial establishments. Such as we buy your houses. And lately, the Payless Furniture, both the one on Main and the one on Chandler, I guess it is. Both in our area, both supposed to be good neighbors of us. Both are irritating the fool out of me and I think it makes that City look bad when you see it. This weekend, Friday night, there were no signs up, when I went by at 8 o'clock, 8 o'clock in the morning on Saturday, there were nine signs at the corner of the five way corner. They've gotten good at putting up the signs on Friday nights and leaving them up til Sunday when they come and take the signs back. The reason their doing that, the City has been much better at collecting these unauthorized signs and making it a little difficult, so they are going around the other way. But they will continue to do this and work out some method to do it as long as there is no consequence for it. My proposal to Council and to the City Administration is either enforce the ordinance that we have now that says you cant do that or if because of the wording of it, how the ordinance is done, that its too difficult to or too cumbersome to, lets come up with a new ordinance that will make it simple. That we can say ok, if you put up the signs or your company is the beneficiary of such signs, your going to pay a fine and make it a possibly a one that goes by step wise upward. So that it starts hurting in the pocketbook. They don't want to put up the signs that's going to cost them more than it could cost them to do advertising somewhere else. That's it, I've been complaining about this for about ten years. And I think maybe, maybe its a good time to

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do it. If anybody here is aggravated as I am, we have a chance or if maybe we can get a ground swell and people say, "no more signs, no more signs." Thank you very much.

Mr. Luzader: And I know exactly what Mr. Brusk is talking about after all my years in the Street Department. We used to pick up signs every single day. I know they have made progress and I know exactly what your talking about. They know on the weekends that the Building Department doesn't work, the Street Department work, therefore they go out and put them up on the weekends. I don't know exactly what the answer is. I don't know if Mr. Hood knows exactly what the answer is. If whether there's a way we could... pardon?

Mr. Hood: Work on Saturday. I share Norm's frustration with this as well. We can work on it. I think the ordinances in place now are sufficient. We could, he admits, we have done better enforcement. We will continue to do better in enforcement. But we have a lot of geographic area that we have to, that we have to patrol. These signs cost about a dollar a piece, so its a never ending kid if cycle. When we take it, we thought that when we confiscated it there signs and tossed it in the trash that that's financial disincentive to do so, not so much anymore. They are very inexpensive to make and produce and it seems like were always chasing our tail with it. But we will continue to do better.

Mr. Luzader: Like you said, I mean I know we've made progress on it, I'm just not sure what the next step is to try to take care of it.

Mr. Joseph: Mr. Hood, beyond removing signs and being aware that they are out there, has the City ever approached the business owners with what they are doing and whether its soft approach or hard approach, let them know they are breaking our City ordinances and their could be repercussions. Have we ever used a direct approach, other than just removing them?

Mr. Hood: My department has not. I have to get with our building officials and our code enforcement officers to ask about that. My suspicion is that they probably use go between's. They probably use a staffing agency or some kind of man power that is separate and apart from the business I think. That's one of the reasons that, when Norm and I discussed this awhile ago, its hard to keep somebody or hold somebody responsible for the actions of someone else. Even if its done to the benefit of your business. So we could certainly look into that.

Mr. Sampson: To answer your question Mr. Joseph, President Joseph, we do. We contact the businesses, we collect the signs. Typically I have a phone number, we reach out the businesses and offer that if they want to come pick them up they can. They typically do not. But it's, it is, it is chasing your tail. How many code compliance officers did we have when you were on staff, Mr Luzader?

Mr. Luzader: When I was on staff? Well we started with none. That was a long time ago.

Mr. Sampson: Well when I was on DRB we had four. So we have two now. So you know, and with code compliance, it is. You are, it is not a fun task. And its dealing with both businesses and residents and our two code compliance officers do an outstanding job. You know for alternatives, I

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would be very open to hearing those from council members. What we can do. We do lack teeth, you know we cant find them. We do lack teeth. We can push far enough that we can bring them into court, is that accurate Mr. Hood?

Mr. Sampson: You know bring them into court but it is a challenge. And it's, and again its one that never ending. So, but any suggestions please. Reach out to me, reach out to our Building Department and they can be happy to enlighten you and share with you some of their experiences.

Mr. Joseph: Ok this is the item that Councilman Clemens had requested I believe be added some weeks back and we had the applicant here discussing it. There was talk about some changes to it, does anyone have any comment or particular idea of making any changes to this tonight or should we move this forward as submitted.

Mr. Cotner: I know one of the changes we talked a lot about was the alcohol and if they were start serving alcohol. We were looking to put, I feel we should put limitation on this that if they, I know he said that's not his plans but if he did expand... I don't want to find out selves down the road and we cant add that in.

Mr. Joseph: Do you want to make a motion with a that in a specific motion?

Mr. Cotner: Yes, please.

Clerk Beggerow: It was, there you go.

Mr. Hood: If it is the prerogative of City Council I guess I would suggest that if your concerned enough about alcohol sales on the premises, that you either prohibit that as part of the special exception use permit or if its something that you would like to investigate, if there is an application made, that you bring him back in before Council, either prior to or just after he applies for, with the department of liquor control for a permit for the establishment. Kind of like a trigger in there. Because as we said last time, once these are approved, there's really not a mechanism for them to come before Council afterwards. If your remember, Mr. Clemens example was we approved an eating establishment and as soon as they've got the change in zoning or the change in use, they asked for a liquor permit that was never discussed with you before. It is a loophole if that's the correct term. But we do have mechanism if you would like to put a review process on it. Bring him in after six months or like I said, the trigger if they apply for a liquor permit.

Mr. Cotner: And what if we put the restriction on it now and in a year from now or two years or whatever, he were to come back and say the business is doing really well, I would like to add alcohol, can we amend our special exception at that point if we chose to?

Mr. Hood: If you put either a prohibition or the trigger like I was talking about tonight...

Mr. Cotner: No, what I'm saying is tonight, if we put the prohibition in to that particular business...

Mr. Hood: And he would like to do this in the future...

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Mr. Cotner: Can we chose, because again if we just leave it up the liquor control, were not going to get anywhere so...

Mr. Hood: I understand.

Mr. Cotner: So I was thinking we then, he comes, you know the business is doing great, everything is going really well over there.

Mr. Hood: You would like to remove the condition sometime in the future?

Mr. Cotner: Correct.

Mr. Hood: Yes, that is within the Councils purview. But I think you need to put the trigger in tonight to have him come before the Council if he applies for a liquor permit in the future, if he would.

Mr. Cotner: Ok.

Mr. Joseph: Mr. Hood are you aware, have we done that in the past with something specific and what was the time frame if you recall at all?

Mr. Hood: Can you be more specific? I don't know what you mean as far have we done this is the past.

Mr. Joseph: Well the trigger process your talking about where we approve something with the idea that in the future an applicant might want to...

Mr. Hood: No, generally not. Generally its just a prohibition when Council is concerned enough. But remember, were talking speculatively. The gentleman didn't say that he wants to do this but it may be something he wants to do in the future. You have to take him at his word if you'd like to.

Mr. Joseph: Ok, well that obviously gives everybody some options down the road.

Mr. Hood: You know and Andrew, Mr. Bowsher, excuse me, just made a very good point, we are looking at a rewrite in our zoning code next year. So the process may be a bit different next year once we do the top to bottom rewrite. Its a bit speculative. I would at the very least encourage Council as I always do, to put a six month review on here to make sure that there actually using the premises as they had applied for and also presented it to the City Council.

Mr. Cotner: I think that's...

Mr. Hood: No option for a bait and switch type thing.

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Mr. Cotner: And I think that's what putting the prohibition tonight does, if we want to take it back later we can, But by saying tonight we don't want there to be alcohol at that establishment, were doing exactly what he wants with that business. He said he doesn't plan on doing this, and again if things were to change for him in a year or two years. He can come back to Council and we can make that change pretty easily but I think the way to go is to allow him to open up exactly as he assured us he would. And support him in every way possible.

Mr. Joseph: With the six month review?

Mr. Cotner: I don't think the six month review is ever a bad idea. I would like, again myself, to feel no alcohol and then a six month review just again, keeps us in touch with everybody.

Mr. Joseph: Oh, I'm sorry, Mr. Spalding.

Mr. Spalding: And I would totally agree with you because that's was what the Council Clemens concern was. Is that he wanted there to be a prohibition on there because he said, the last thing I want to see if we start games and then the next thing its alcohol. We go from one to other just so rapidly. Because he was concerned about this situation that happened earlier. So I understand, that is exactly what he wanted. So I think that your echoing what another Council person has said and I totally concur.

Mr. Joseph: And we actually had an example like that's some years ago when we had an establishment that did billiard competitions on Brice Road. And he didn't ask for any type of liquor permit but later he wanted to sell beer. And the Council at the time didn't want to make that change. And he later moved his establishment to Pickerington, which was obviously his right. But so, that was an example, where we did do that. We put that control on up front. Yes, Mr. Baker.

Mr. Baker: So what's, the trigger, and he applied for the liquor license he comes to Council, we can reject it then too correct, or does it have to be the prohibition.

Mr. Hood: Well yea, you wouldn't be waiving anything. But I think we are talking about two different things unless this is getting caught up in the wash a bit. At the very least, he could always or another owner in right, could make a new application under the existing ordinances now. So it wouldn't be totally dependent upon what you do this evening. The problem with that is, unless there's a dramatic change in the use, a new special exception use permit may not be requires. So it just depends on how much they change the business, if they change the business at all. That's why I'm always in favor of the review. Sometimes, they, sometimes, we have been given the idea that the business was going to be one thing and after they get up and running, they change it into something else. They morph it into something else and honestly unless we put a six month review on it. We don't have the ability to bring them back in to either Development Department or Building Department or whatever, discuss with the council members, this is exactly as they promised to you. It is different that they promised to you. Unless they do something drastic. Say look your violating the terms of the special exception use permit, this is

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not a permitted use in the district. However, we are allowing it with certain conditions and one condition may be no alcohol sales in this instance.

Mr. Joseph: Yes, Ms. Bryant.

Ms. Bryant: Mr. Hood, can we put in a, not only a review, you know six month review but we, could we also put something in saying that if we intends to apply for liquor permit, he needs to come back to Council 90 days prior to doing that.

Mr. Hood: That's my trigger. That's what I was thinking about as far as trigger goes. If that's what you wish to do. I think Councilman Clemens was the most concerned about his at least initially. I think that he would recommend that we prohibit that and if they would like to do that, they come to us voluntarily as opposed to us you know putting it in the special exception use permit. But I'm probably talking a little bit out of school. You know, its unfortunate he is not here tonight being ill. So, but and once again I think that what Mr. Bowsher said, some of this may be mute depending on we change our special exception use permit procedure going forward. After we do the rewrite and the zoning code. I didn't consider that, but I think its something at least to be aware of as we move forward this evening. The other thing, I don't think we should make anything more difficult than it has to be. The gentleman doesn't intend to sell alcohol, he doesn't want to sell alcohol at this point in time. I think if you prohibit it, he admitted that last week or last meeting that he wouldn't have a problem with that, he just wants to have a video game business with you know younger folks. I think that's the target audience. I think that if you do that and if turns out some point in the future that he wants to change, he can come through another process.

Mr. Cotner: Ok, so I will make a motion with recommendation for approval with the exception that alcohol sales are prohibited at the location and we ask him or when we do a sixth month review to monitor the business and yea, that would be my motion.

Mr. Hood: Councilman Cotner, your motion is that there is no prohibition as a condition of the Special Exception Use permit.

Mr. Cotner: That is correct.

Mr. Hood: And that we have a six month review to make sure that they are complying with the terms of the Special Exception Use permit?

Mr. Cotner: Yes, thank you. That is my motion.

Mr. Joseph: Does this have to be an amendment or does this have to be just, this is the, were just establishing it.

Clerk Beggerow: You are making a motion to approve...

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Mr. Joseph: With those stipulations, ok.

Mr. Hood: Yes.

Mr. Cotner: The comment is again, you know, this isn't being overly difficult, this is what he promised us, he didn't attend to make alcohol sales. Just to be on the safe side we make sure that that's what were following through with.

Mr. Joseph: And with clarification that it can be revisited by Council at later date if there is a different opinion by both the applicant and the Council.

Mr. Cotner: Of course. If he were to change his business a that time then yea but this all honors what he is doing and were just trying to make sure its clarified for the City's protection.

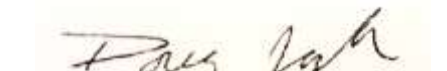
