President Pro Tempore Long: As was discussed in the earlier Committee Meetings, Item 10. F. Will be removed from the agenda, and Item 11. a. Will be held for two weeks.

Community Comments and Requests

President Pro Tempore Long: I have three speaker requests. State your name and address and limit your comments to three minutes please.

Ms. Rupert: I will try. My name is Christy Rupert. I live on John St. We have a lot of construction in our tiny neighborhood right now. The City has quite a few projects that they are planning in that area. And, the thin of it is, there is one piece of property that evidentially the City is interested in. But we are not for certain as a neighborhood, what exactly it is that you are looking to do with that. Does anyone know which one I am talking about?

President Pro Tempore Long: I am not aware of anything. Mr. Snowden are you aware of any property that the City is interested in out on John St.?

Ms. Rupert: At John and Truro, it is right when you come around the curb. There is a piece of property on the left hand side when you turn on Truru.

Mr. Snowden: Mr. Long, and other Members of Council, there is a property on the west side of Truro, just north of the parcel that is owned by Redwood. Redwood has offered to donate that property to the City to be added to the Water and/or Parks and Recreation complex. But, there is no specific plan for anything on the land, at this time.

President Pro Tempore Long: Thank you. So, at this time, the City has no control or involvement in it, other than discussions on what might happen, if this gift to the City comes through.

Ms. Rupert: And also, there is a disability housing going into the neighborhood on Truro, and the thing of it is, we have heard different aspects of the housing that goes into the City. Does anybody know how many houses are in the City right now as a disability housing?

President Pro Tempore Long: We are not provided that information, Ma'am.

Ms. Rupert: Ok, because I was wondering how many of them are still disability housing. Because, what is happening is a lot of these homes are coming in. They start out as disability, and then they turn around and become other things. Which is a big concern to us because we are having one put in our neighborhood. If there is anyway someone could share with us, information about that, because we don't want it to turn into something different than what is being explained to us right now. The other thing, the traffic on 256, we would like to know if due to the fact that Blacklick Point is going to be developed, is there going to be a traffic safety study about 256. Between 4:00 and 6:00, we can not get out of our neighborhood. There are going to be 320 parking spaces over in the Blacklick Point. So, I would like to see if anybody knows anything about that, if there is going to be anything discussed.

President Pro Tempore Long: One of the items that Mr. Snowden can talk to you about is that part of a development application/building permit would be a traffic study for a development that size. Mr. Sampson, do you have any comment on that?

Mr. Sampson: I am able to address several of your points Ma'am. The Point at Blacklick development, during the pre-construction meeting we defined that they were not to be on John Road and I confirmed that again today that they were limited strictly to Lancaster Avenue for ingress/egress to that site. If you see something different...

Ms. Rupert: That is not what we are asking about. We are asking about State Route 256.

Mr. Sampson: I know, I am just addressing the Point at Blacklick and the traffic that is going...

Ms. Rupert: Right, but we are talking about, that is backed up now. How are those people going to get out onto 256?

Mr. Sampson: Ma'am, we have a meeting with MORPC to discuss traffic studies. We have four to five traffic studies to address with MORPC, potentially for ODOT to come in and look at some of the more vulnerable intersections we have in the City, and that is one of them. And that occurs on Thursday.

Ms. Rupert: That is on Thursday? Are any of the residents allowed to come to that?

Mr. Sampson: No Ma'am. I will be happy to meet with you afterward, but it is strictly a meeting between myself and MORPC. It is an exploratory meeting for us to understand what ODOT and MORPC have to offer, and what we can take advantage of for some of the intersections we have within our community.

Ms. Rupert: So, you are aware of the situation. Like I said there is so much traffic coming out of that area and on to 256. Eventually it is going to back up my street. A lot of you know Truro and John, they are going to be coming down Truro, and onto John, and backing it up. Because they think they are going to miss the traffic jam, basically.

Mr. Sampson: Our goal Ma'am is to explore having traffic studies done. Understand what that volume is going to be and what we can do to alleviate any future traffic issues.

Ms. Rupert: And also, for you gentlemen, there was a question about whether we owned property onto the Blacklick Point, and I do have the proof of that. So, I talked to Redwood this morning, and gave him a copy also. It is also here for whoever needs.

President Pro Tempore Long: If you would please follow up with any paper work that you have, along with the answers you have and don't have, with Mr. Sampson, and he will be more than happy to help you out with this.

Mr. Sampson: let me make a comment quickly on the group home on Truro. We had a public meeting between the residents and the developer on Wednesday, August 3rd, for an opportunity for their residents to speak to the developer to really understand and get your arms around what the group home house configuration will be, who the residents will be, the landscaping, ingress/egress to it, parking. I think they provided a very comprehensive overview as far as what they plan on doing. There are 20 plus group homes now in the city of Columbus. We have received the plot grade utility from the developer, and it has been forwarded to our city engineer for review. Once we have that back we will be set to move forward.

Ms. Rupert: I don't think that is the problem we have, it's just eventually that is what it will turn out to be. Not just this home, as a disability. They do not stay that way.

Mr. Sampson: I have no information on what they are. We understand from the developer what they intend to do. We understand other group homes throughout Central Ohio and the State, and the longevity of those homes. We will be happy to get that information from you and share that with you.

Chairman Clemens: There was a traffic study done about eight years ago.

President Pro Tempore Long: There may have been, but depending on the number of units, or number of families who are going to be in the area, it may not be plausible, or may not be current. Thank you Ma'am. The next speaker slip I have is for a Chris Carle.

Mr. Carle: I am Chris Carle. I live on Truro Ave. If I could real quick go back to the last speaker and make a comment that shouldn't that study of the traffic been done before this was even allowed to move forward with? Why are we talking about looking at doing a study now, look at doing a

study here and there. Shouldn't that have been done a lot earlier, before they were given the permission to move forward with this project?

Mayor McCloud: I think the meeting that Mr. Samson was talking about is where the administration has been in discussion with Mid Ohio Regional Planning about a handful of intersections that are high volume and high crash volume, and the five way is one of them. That is what Mr. Sampson is talking about. I know there was a traffic study done. Mel, I think you are exactly right. We will put our hands on that and make that available to you and the residents.

Mr. Carle: As silly as this is, I ordered food from Scali's. It took be 25 minutes to get from Truro Avenue, which is 300-400 yards, to Scali's. That was how bad the traffic was on Friday.

Mr. Cicak: I think Palmer Road was shut down that weekend.

Mr. Carle: I will get to my point real quick. It will take two minutes. My complaint is, I live on Truro Avenue, you have your trucks and things coming out of the water plant and the parks and rec area down there. And I have asked multiple times for these people to slow down. I have asked multiple times for these people to slow down. I have called into Reynoldsburg and talked to people down there. They have sent me down to talk to somebody there. Here is what I get last week in front of my house from your employees, I get, we are going to pull out, we are going to rev our engines. We are going to go two miles an hour like children, in front of my house. And then, when they get past my house, that is when they are going to take off. So when I complain about it, I get do you have a truck number, do you have this, do you have that. I don't run out into the street and get a truck number. They know it is going on. They do the same thing when they come in in the morning and when they leave in the afternoon, they bolt out of there like bats out of heck and speed up our street. Do I always go the speed that is posted, absolutely not, I will admit it. But I am not going 40-50 mph. I am not revving my engine in front of my neighbors place of residence. I just think it is really childish, what is going on here, and I think there needs an end put to it immediately.

President Pro Tempore Long: I would appreciate it if you did get a plate number, or truck number, and we will follow through with the responsible supervisors here in the City.

Mr. Carle: I can go down there and I can point the trucks out, but I cant tell you what people are driving. Perfect example was, I had a young guy, he actually was going the two miles an hour and he got his vehicle, a black little chevy, came tearing out of there. Again, it is really childish. My next option, since I actually live in Truro, is to call the Sheriff and have him come out. I think we can resolve this easily with you guys. I would just ask that you have a conversation. I have called many a times. I know Mr. Sampson apparently had a meeting and had asked them to slow down.

President Pro Tempore Long: Apparently they have to a point that now it is a little ridiculous.

Councilman Cotner: I know it sounds so childish that we have to even talk about this, but was this within the last week?

Mr. Carle: Yes it was. That is terrible.

Councilman Skinner: I know it stinks to ask you to put the extra work, but I think the most bang for the buck, so to speak, if you could make a note on the time, the day, and if you could get any identifying information on the truck, because it could be individual people rebelling against what is going on. So, we would need to do individual discipline.

Mr. Carle: Here is what happened a week and a half ago, I went out there on my lawn chair and I set at the end of my driveway and I had my camera on my phone. I didn't have it on but I acted like I was recording, and when I did, everyone slowed down. It is ridiculous that you have to go to that end to get them to stop that kind of stuff. It isn't that it has been going on for just the last month, it has been going on down there for years, it has just kinda come to a head at this point.

Councilman Clemens: I think the simplest thing is, have the Service Director meet with the Superintendents down there, have a meeting with their people, and tell them to stop it. It is just that simple. Ask them to stop it and forget about it.

Mr. Carle: We have been great neighbors to them and most of the time they have been the same to us. Parks and rec the same thing. I have coached ball and stuff for ten, twelve years and it has been a great experience. Again, it goes back to not being childish.

President Pro Tempore Long: I am sure that Mr. Sampson will follow up. Please, if you do get a plate number, or the time it came by, we know who was driving it.

Councilman Luzader: Now I know there is traffic all the time on 256, but last Friday, there was a power outage. Traffic got backed up. When the power came back on, the traffic light at Taylor Road SW and 256 remained on flash, and that backed traffic up on Graham Road, on 256, all the way to Main Street, until ODOT got out there and reset it. It is not an excuse, but for that day, there was an exception.

Mr. Sampson: That is correct. AEP was doing testing and were shutting the electricity on and off and unfortunately they knocked the signal out. ODOT was contacted.

President Pro Tempore Long: Thank you everyone. The third speaker slip, perhaps on a more pleasant note, Mary Hudson has a report on the Reynoldsburg Tomato Festival.

Ms. Hudson: Good evening Mayor McCloud, President Pro Tempore Long, Council Members, and our attending public, Chuck Cocheran and myself are here representing the Reynoldsburg Tomato Festival. Also, one of our Board Members, Brett Luzader, sits among you. We are here tonight to thank you so much for your support. Our 51st Annual Tomato Festival was held in August. We would have been here sooner, but we wanted you to have time to get the bugs out with your new setup. We want to thank you so much. The Festival Board is a 501(c)3, that is comprised of volunteers that have put on the current festival that is in Huber Park for the last seven years. We are here to thank the City, and all of you personally, for your continued support of this long standing

Reynoldsburg event. This year we celebrated 51 years. Without all of your support, we could not provide this celebration of our history to both residents and visitors alike. We than Mayor McCloud and his administration, who help us with electricity. Do you live there for two days? Yes you do. You sing for us. I mean, how much can you do for us? I want to thank Parks and Recreation for the manpower that they provide to us to run the Festival. We also receive help from the Street Department, the Service Department, the Auditor's office, the Water Department. We have people from the Development Department, the City Attorney's Office. Everyone in this building, and involved with the City, helps us in some way. And, all of you personally have helped us with either being sponsors, you have taken out ads, you have been friends with the festival, you have participated, volunteered, and you have attended. Again, we than you all. We hope that as a city, that we improve upon it by brining in new things so that it becomes bigger and better. I think this is our crown jewel. This year was really fun. We did have rain. Obviously we were affected by that, but we were very fortunate. We brought in ponies, who were absolutely a smash. They were the cutest things and were very popular. Really, you don't think about it, but it was contacts, and exits and everything else, and we were very pleased. Lieutenant Posey said that it might even be used as a pilot because of the time that we spent on it and how it was put together. And because of the weather we had to close three hours early on Saturday, and we put the plan into place. So, we are very happy that worked out that way. It was nice to put it together and know that if anything happens in the future, we will know what we will be doing. We did have to close because of the weather. It was shortened, but we still had a great run for the Festival. Thank you again so much for all that you do. We hope to see you next year for 2017, on August 18th and 19th.

Mr. Cochran: Mary and I also partner on the Community Association, so I just want to take an opportunity while I am here to thank City Council and the City for their partnership. And also, to invite all of you October 22nd to the Community Halloween party. As everyone knows, the Community loves that event, so we are looking forward to that from 6-9 in the evening. So, bring your family and come on out. We would love to see all of you that evening.

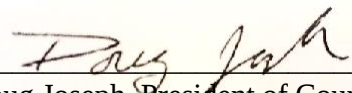
