Community Comments and Requests

Gina Tata, I represent the Livingston Center which is 1901 and 1929 St. Route 256, Tata, Inc.

Jack Witt, The Basement Doctor 7369 E. Livingston Ave.

Melissa Wilde, 7333 E. Livingston Ave

Ms. Tata: Good evening, my name is Gina Tata, I am with Tata Incorporated and as I said I represent the property at 1901- 1929 SR 256. My family recently purchased that property, about 3 months ago and I don't know if you folks are aware of it or not, but there is an access road that runs parallel to that property from the Livingston Avenue to SR 256. The conditions of the surface of that road are poor, there are many pot holes, uneven pavement, it is in serious need of some surface repair. I have contacted the four other property owners that are adjacent to this road and 2 of those property owners are with us this evening, trying to find a solution to take care of that road. Since we are all tax payers, we have come forward to see if the City of Reynoldsburg is willing to take on that road and maintain it for us. Because the cost of doing the repairs is quite high. What really needs to be done right now is that road has to be milled, and new asphalt has to be put down, there is no patching any more it's just too bad to do that. So, we are asking for you folks to help us.

Jack Witt with the Basement Doctor. Gina brought us together to come to some resolution, help with this, I know the Basement Doctor's patched it with pothole sealer in the past. Trying to get all of the owners involved over a number of years but to no avail and no success. Whoever owned the plaza before Gina was unresponsive and didn't respond our inquiries the number of years so I think it puts undue hardship on the business owners to try to come together especially with the properties being overturned and bought and sold by other businesses, there's no, to my knowledge there's nothing legal we can do, we can just simply ask or request. I know the city could repair it and put a tax lien on all of the properties. I know the Basement Doctor is willing to pay it's fair share to get the road up to code and have the city take over so we don't have this sort of continual problem. It's

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been historically a problem forever as far as I'm aware, but I'm open to suggestions for any resolutions that would be fair to come to an agreement on this matter.

Melissa Wilde: I think I share some of the same concerns, I know one of the owners with the Tim Hortons is no longer there. I'm brand new over there coming into this trying to help find a solution in my opinion and what needs to happen is that the city does need to take over that road. Trying to have 5 people from all across the US because Tim Hortons isn't even in the US, or not even in Ohio, they're located elsewhere, I think that if the city could take that on for us it would create a little bit of appreciation from the business owners over there. I know we all have other businesses that are inside of our businesses so, I think you have a lot of residents, a lot of tax payers that would be appreciative.

Mr. Baker: Just real quick, have you all talked to Mr. Andrew Bowsher since he's the Development Director? Andrew or Bill would you be willing to speak with these fine individuals about this issue?

Mr. Sampson: Inaudible (off mic)

Mr. Bowsher: And I could do the same.

Mr. Spalding: I don't think there is any dispute how bad that road is. I lost my car in it today. I was at the Basement Doctor and thought where is it, it's gone. But I mean, it's really, it's as bad as they say. We complain about Palmer Road, we complain about Main Street, no no no, that's the worst street in our city, absolutely, no doubt about it.

Ms. Wilde: And we as business owners, we take pride in our buildings we want to maintain nice buildings over there but it comes to a point where it's just a hardship for us to get everybody on the same page at the same time and come up with those resources.

Mr. Spalding: Good point.

Mayor McCloud: Inaudible but expressed that it is not a publicly owned street.

President Joseph: Mr. Hood, could you weigh in on whether or not we even have the legal authority to take over such a road.

Mr. Hood: Yes, we cannot spend public dollars on private roadway improvements, however, if we have a combination or majority of the private owners, we could at least explore the option of a special assessment which would be, well we don't need to get into that tonight, but why don't we have a meeting to explore potential options before we start talking publicly at the Council meeting, but generally the Mayor's comment was absolutely correct, we cannot spend public dollars on private property. If it becomes public property, we have a responsibility to do that but it gets in line with all the other public property, we need to rehabilitate and its on our street program. In my mind, if we have willing owners that want to get the project done and are willing to pay for it, a special assessment project may be an option we can at least explore. Which means, the city would

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undertake the project, spend the money, but be paid back by the property owners. Kind of like our sidewalk projects if anybody here during the sidewalk programs. Similar to that, obviously not the scope. But I think what we need to do is, now that we've been alerted to this, we need to sit down and have a meeting and bring something to the table.

Mr. Sampson: This property has been on my radar for the past several years. Since my coming on board, we have worked diligently to corral the landlords to participate with very minimal response. That would be my first recommendation is that we, it is private property, we, it is not a city owned street. I agree with Jed, that my thought would be move forward with an assessment that we could do it and then assess the landlord and the tenants much like we do on our sidewalk program.

Ms. Wilde: So I get the assessment thing, but I also pay \$24,000 in taxes every year and I don't send a single child to this school district. So I am subsidizing a lot of children going to school here. I happily pay my \$24,000 but to have another tax assessed on top of those taxes, I would like to come to another conclusion where this is a long term fix and not a short term fix. Because short term, we can fix this road and we're still going to have these conversations come up with well now whose going to pay to.. remove the snow because now we have somebody who doesn't live in Ohio who is also on this list of people. So we're always going to have a problem. Is this always going to be a problem as long as all 5 people own that road. So that's my concern. I don't think that 5 people owning this road is the solution long term.

Mr. Sampson: Well, that's why we have a City Council. This is your decision. If you want to move forward with legislation to bring this road into the City, Mr. Spalding, Mr. Clemens, any Council member who has a passion for the road and the deterioration of that road and if we want to bring it up we'd be responsible for maintaining it and that includes both paving and snow removal.

President Joseph: I would like to know and I'm sure Council would like to know what kind of cost were you even looking at to bring that up to proper.. do you have that documentation?

Mr. Clemens: This is something that has to be worked with. I suggest you meet with the City Attorney and Service Director and then bring it to Council. We can't solve it just sitting here tonight. That's what we have a City Attorney for, that's what we have a Service Director for. We're talking about like the Mayor, I agree exactly what the Mayor said, it's public property spending public money. Now if they want to be assessed, I have no problem with that. I think you have to meet with our City Attorney. How we feel about it right now doesn't mean a thing, there's laws, wait til I get done ok?

President Joseph: Yeah, we need to see all of the options, see what you can come up with administratively first and if there is still any type of impasse there, then make a proposal and we can take a look at it as far as the City assuming responsibility, because again, we have a lot of roads and streets in this city that are waiting for repairs now and there is no guarantee we'd go to the front of the line. It could be anywhere assuming we even took over those roads. So see what you can come up with working with Mr. Sampson and our City Attorney first and then you can come back here if you don't feel like you've gotten the answers you need.

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Mr. Spalding: Bringing your whole group together tonight was important because it shows that there's a concern.. so the process was perfect up until this point. I appreciate you all coming here tonight.

Mr. Sampson: I'm going to give you my business card and Jed and I will set up a time where we can meet when it's more convenient and we'll come up with a solution. Again, this has been a frustration. I don't eat at Scali's because I'm afraid to show my face. You know and I've got my hands tied behind my back. There's nothing as a Service Department we can do because it is not a City street. But we want to work with you. Our intent is, again, we want to see businesses flourish and again, it reflects on the city and it's private property, people drive by, people drive through it and see the condition its in, it's a poor statement. So lets work together again, we've been aggressive on this for the past several years. We've tried to work with the landlords with no result. So lets try the next step.

President Joseph: Alright, moving on, we have 2 slips dealing with the Taylor Road Project.

Thaah Young, 9167 Taylor Road: I'm here to talk about the Taylor Road Metro Development Project. That we asked on August 20th, the Development Director in regards to the Planning Commission hearing if the City was going to be sending out Public Hearing notices. That was August 20th. We did receive a response from Mr. Bowsher on the 28th which was we have yet to receive updated information from the developer and yes there would be public hearing notices once we receive information. On August 31st we received an email from Mr. Bowsher and he said that we will not be sending out hard letters to the residents per code and that code was written in May so I'm not sure that that retained. So I sent an email to Planning Commission members and some City Council members and basically stated that the City's Charter was very clear that if an application is being presented to the Planning Commission with changes or without changes, it's considered new and the public has a right to know when that meeting is and to ask questions. The City and Metro Development demonstrated that they agreed with this understanding of the Charter based on the fact that the City and Metro Development have had community meetings to discuss new plans and the City has notified public notices the surrounding before every Planning Commission meeting. This was the third Planning Commission meeting. We did ask the Planning Commission to postpone this meeting until October in order for the public to be notified. We did not get a response to that request. The Planning Commission has referred the Metro application back to City Council this time. Tonight, I'm asking City Council members who have ever taken campaign contributions from Metro Development, their affiliated companies and Metro's immediate family members to recuse themselves of any review discussion of or in voting of this application. I do appreciate you time and thank you.

Linda F. Grimes, 1370 Reserve Dr: I guess I have sort of well, a comment of course but it's more in the form of a question. When these meetings for Metro Development first began, I was not notified. So I didn't know they were going on at all. And then the month of March I believe I received a couple of notices to let me know that this was in process and that it was going to be before the Zoning Commission. Now the meeting I attended in March, I thought that if there was not a

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recommendation from the Zoning Commission to move forward that what they were going to do was recommend that it end at that point and that Metro Development would have to re-submit in 12 months time a new plan. But that's not what has happened, so we're still attending meetings with regard to the same issue and so my question is, did I misunderstand that? Because if they were to end or cease for right now, or then and not be able to move forward for consideration with this particular project for 12 months and then resubmit a new plan, did I misunderstand what I heard in March?

President Joseph: This is actually a time for public comment and not to ask questions but I'll ask our Development Director, do you have any insight to her question?

Ms. Grimes: With regard to the project with Metro Development, that exists on Taylor Road, that proposal, in the meeting in March, I thought it was clear that the proposal as it existed then was over that because it was not going to move forward as it was, that they would have to re-submit in 12 months time with a new plan.

Mr. Bowsher: Its never been completely denied, it's only been sent back to planning commission now for the third time and now it passed again to city council. City Council has never voted it fully down, it's just been pushed back to Planning Commission, does that answer your question? So they've never had to re-submit a new application, it has just been amendments to the very first application that came in December or January, when I came on board.

President Joseph: The Service Committee will be reviewing it again in 2 weeks.

Ms. Grimes: I understand it wasn't on the agenda so I didn't want to stand here and voice objections at this point in time, I just wanted to get a clarification.

President Joseph: We'll be dealing with it again in 2 weeks. Any questions of the speaker? Thank you. Lastly we have a number of students from Reynoldsburg High School, they want to come up and introduce themselves and have some comments on events and announcements.

RHS Student Council: RHS Student Council members Alejandra Zamora, Katelyn Whetsel, and Emmanuel Lang

Miss Zamora: Good evening. We would like to thank you for the opportunity for allowing us to speak on behalf of Student Council. A couple of events are happening very soon in our community and we would love to inform you about them.

Miss Whetsel: the first thing is about our homecoming parade which takes place on September 20th and we'd like to extend an invitation to all of you to walk in the parade. The parade has been Student Council's pride and joy for the last 3 years now and we are proud to make this a Reynoldsburg tradition by expanding on it year by year. We are also having a carnival at Livingston parking lot from 4:15-6:15 pm which will include food trucks, vendors and carnival games. Line up is at 6:00 and will begin the parade at promptly 6:35. We do ask that you appear in Raider wear to promote unity between the city and the schools. Any campaigning is discouraged and simply attend and show your support. Thank you and we hope to see you there.

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Mr. --: Do you consider yourself an active member of the Reynoldsburg community? If you believe yourself to be then you can help your community by donating canned goods hydrated foods, hygiene based items in our upcoming event. You'll be part of an event that no district other than ours has undertaken. This year, we are beginning our inaugural 2018 food drive fill the bus. Everyone who desires to participate has the opportunity to donate these items at the following locations: During the homecoming parade and homecoming game inside the stadium on the away side. If you have items you wish to be donated please see that the items are not past their expiration date, do not need to be refrigerated and that the packaging is not broken or sealed properly. If the food does not meet the listed criteria, then sadly, the food will not be accepted. The reason that we are hosting this event is to supply donated goods to 2 of our local food banks: the Hart food pantry and Reynoldsburg Helping Hands. Both of the organizations have been active constituents in supplying food for our families in Reynoldsburg for a long time. With that said, we would like Reynoldsburg City Council to come and join us in the communal endeavor.

President Joseph: I would just like to give a shout out to the Mayor, Service Director and the Street Department on the patching on East Main Street. I was getting questioned on that regularly about the condition. I know that the state has pushed back full repairs on that for a bit, so I do appreciate those patches it definitely improved things. So thank you.

Mr. Luzader: Thank you President Joseph. While we were off on our break last month, I was approached last month by a lady, Linda Hoetger from a group called Zero, who's goal is to end prostate cancer. I've asked her and her husband Ray if they'd like to come up and say a couple of words about the group and what they hope to achieve before I read the Resolution.

Linda Hoetger: My name is Linda. I've been with Zero since 2012. It's an organization that helps raise funds for prostate cancer. We want to end prostate cancer, hopefully soon. In 2009 my husband was diagnosed with an aggressive form of prostate cancer. I didn't want to sit back and do nothing, I wanted to do something. So Zero had contacted me and said hey we want you on our team. So I graciously accepted and like I said I've been with them ever since. Every year

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we go to Washington DC and we talk with congressmen, senators, and whoever will listen on Capitol Hill to ask for funding. If we don't ask for funding, then the funds go to other cancers and stuff and we want to keep it for prostate cancer. In February when we were there we asked for \$100 million dollars and as we were leaving we were told hey you got the 100 million. So in February when we go back next year we're going to ask for \$110 million. I'd like to thank Mayor McCloud for his support and for you guys' s support because we need to get rid of prostate cancer and it's ok to say you have prostate cancer, you are not alone, just start speaking up like I've been doing. As of today I'm about that close to getting 200 proclamations. This is my husband Ray.

Ray Hoetger: Right now there is three million men with prostate cancer in the United States. So I am one in three million. I'm all about numbers. I was in the military, if I had been a civilian I would have had a better chance not to get prostate cancer. One in 9 men will get prostate cancer, but if you are in the military or African American, those odds go down to 1 in 6. Now if you happen to be a fire fighter and a military guy, I just raised my hand and said pick me because it's one in three. After my first four years in the Air Force I changed from fire fighter to weatherman, I thought that was a little bit safer, plus I lie very well. I am one of three sons, I am the only one that has the prostate cancer, I'll gladly take this battle on. My father, grandfather, no prostate cancer. I'm the first generation period with any cancer in my family and I really believe its because I was in the military and a firefighter. I'm in the process of proving that now, yes I am a veteran, I'm not anti-american, I'm not anti-military but I am pro get tested. I was diagnosed when I was 56. I just turned 66 and about 2 weeks ago I had my PSA which is a blood test. It's undetectable so I'm at 0 essentially. Now when I was 50 it was 2. They skipped when I was 51, they did it again when I was 52 and it was almost 5. So it more than doubled. 55 they skipped that too. 56 when I come back from my yearly exam the doctor goes what'd we do last year and I go you go the records right there and she goes oh we forgot to do it last year. We'll have to do that one now and again it more than doubled. It was almost 12. Now I've hear other men that have had their PSA in the thousands. Now my first 5 years I went through radiation, surgery and hormones and right now for the last three years I've been on a hormone holiday. So not hot flashes or power surges but I still worry every 3-4 months when I get my PSA done. The average age for starting if there is no cancer in the family is age 50 and you want to look at that trend in that blood test. If you have cancer of if you are African American, you need to start at 40. Our oldest son 2 years ago switched doctors and he said we're starting your PSA at 35 and my son said oh no I don't have to start until I'm 40 and so its a blood test and its something to look at to follow to get that map to see what's going on. If you guys think about it, think about your 8 closest friends and no you can't go oh its him, its him. I really wish and thank you all for the proclamation and I hope everybody gets tested. Oh by the way do you know what the most common symptom of having prostate cancer is? No symptoms. By the way I had no symptoms. Any questions?

Mr. Spalding: I know both of you fairly well and you do a great job a the VA and you are the epitome of what we want to see giving back to other veterans. So I appreciate your good work. Thank you.

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Mr. Skinner: I would just like to make a comment. Thank you for your service and as a former Air Force member, I'm honored to carry on that tradition with you. Thank you again for your continued courage fighting this, it's a difficult fight. I have prostate cancer in my family as well, luckily they were able to catch it early and beat it very early on. So, I just want to thank you for all of your hard work and dedication towards this cause and your dedication towards your country and your service. Thank you.

Mr. Hoetger: How old are you?

Mr. Skinner: 24.

Mr. Hoetger: Start at 35.

Mr. Skinner: Will do.

Mr. Baker: I missed the boat on that one. I'm 36. Once again, like he said, thank you for your service first of all. Second I congratulate you on beating what was trying to get you. My mother and my mother in law lost the fight to cancer. So I do know what it can and has done. So with that said, I'm going to make my doctor's appointment.

Mr. Hoetger: If your doctor says I can look at you and tell you don't have it, you want to find a new doctor.

Mrs. Hoetger: I just want to add this year we had license plates introduced for Zero to end prostate cancer. It's already passed the House we're waiting for it to pass the Senate, and once it gets passed I'm going to be bugging everybody for signatures. Because I wasn't to be the first to get license plates that say For Dad but it has the prostate cancer ribbon. It's another way to increase funding for prostate cancer.

Mr. Hoetger: Oh yeah, the \$110 million? It's DOD funding. It's not coming out of the budget for this thing or another thing. It's DOD money, DOD has a big pot of money and it goes out for a bunch of research.

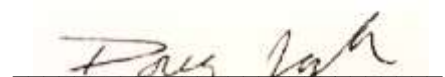
