Ms. Bryant: We have an organization that has been in central Ohio for quite awhile. That has mostly existed on the west side I believe. It's the Ethiopian Tewahedo Social Services. I know I mispronounced that but anyway they have open a law office on McNaughten Road and are going to be providing services to Reynoldsburg residents as well as other people in the area. We've got Dr. Seleshi, who is the CEO of ETSS and Tatinia Bovinski here to do a presentation for us.

Ms. Boviniski: Good evening everybody and thank you. Thank you Council member Kristin Bryant for inviting me to this meeting and giving me the opportunity to introduce ETSS. Again my name is Tatianna Bosinavski, a site coordinator for ETSS. As my son comes around and passes around some flyers for you to take a look at ETSS. Please allow me to tell you a little bit about me and my background. I was born and raised in Macedonia, little balkan country. That used to be part of Yugoslavia. My family and I immigrated from Yugoslavia right before the war started there and in two weeks we will be celebrating our 31st anniversary of being here in America. I was in high school, my brother in middle school and none of us including my parents including my parents spoke any English. In fact, as soon as my brother learned a word or two, our parents and grand parents relied heavily on us to translate and take care of the adult stuff. Such as doctors appointments, reading mail, paying bills, fillings out documents, etc. Now I was a teenager, 16 years old and I wasn't having fun just like the other kids at my age. I felt like I grew up very quickly and I skipped a huge part of my childhood of being a teenager and doing all kinds of crazy things teenagers like to do. From an A student back home, a class president and involved in a bunch extra curriculum activities such as choirs, scouts, mentoring younger kids, competing in poetry and so on. I came from school many times telling my parents I had not spoken one word the entire day. In fact I was afraid to look at anyone because I feared that they would talk to me and I would not have any

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idea what they are saying to me and what I would say in that matter. The reason why I'm telling you all this is because I know what they new American families are going through right now when they come to our country. The challenges they are now facing may even be greater than the challenges my family and I faced. For an example 30 years ago when we came, technology was no implemented in every day life. So we didn't have to worry about computers, emails, e-dcouments, applying on time, job interviews that we find out via e-mail. And that is jus tone example. There's so much more to worry about now whether you are an adult, a young individual and elderly. Especially if you come from some place else and you have to learn everything from zero. Luckily there are organization like ETSS to help these individuals. ETSS, short for Ethiopian Tewahedo Social Services. And Tewahedo meaning all in one or unity, was founded by Dr. Seleshi, who came with me today. His family, Dr. Seleshi and his family immigrated from Ethiopia and what started out as a very small organization helping just a handful of people from Ethiopia, ETSS is now and organization that help immigrants and refugees from all countries. Establish roots and gain self sufficiency here in central Ohio. It is organization spread in twelve sites strategically throughout Franklin county. Offering youth programs such as after school tutoring K through 12, summer camps, youth employment and adults programs, family care programs, community involvement and a lot more. I would like to concentrate on our new location, here on the east side. Basically it is on our backyard. Being a Reynoldsburg resident fro many many years, I noticed that the demographics here are rapidly changing. Where as our youth programs has been in full force here on the east side for more than ten years, we didn't have much to offer to the adults. The nearest office for the east side individuals was the downtown office. Not terribly far but inconvenient at times. So I sprung into action, talked to neighbors, community leaders, visited schools here in Reynoldsburg and then reported to my bosses. We needed an office that will serve the adult new Americans, here on the east side. Indian Creek Apartments on Lancaster Avenue graciously gave of their club house to use a couple of nights per week to use for an evening class until we find a permanent home. So permanent home we did find. And our new office is located now at 588 McNaughten Road and we offer ESOL and American Citizenship classes every day, Monday through Friday. We also have two evenings classes, two evenings during the week in order to serve the individuals that work during the day. In addition to the classes, we have work force development, case management and community health mitigation professionals as well as interpreters. We have been working very closely with Reynoldsburg City Schools and the interpreting and development departments. We are committed in continuing our well establish partnerships with the schools. But to go back to the adults, I like to talk about the new program we are starting in February called the Work Key Skills Training Program. It is a nationally recognized work skills program and certification program created by the testing company ACT, that teaches the math and reading skills that employers most look for in job applications. Completion of the training program allows participants to obtain the national career readiness certificate, a nationally certification that measures and certifies the essential work skills needed fro success in jobs across industries and occupations.

WEST LICKING FIRE DISTRICT BOARD REPORT

Mr. Spalding: The West Licking Fire Board December report and the things that were important there and that are not specifically on the report was that they gave the year end statistics and it was almost 5,000 runs that West Licking Fire had which was the highest. They just purchased a just over a million dollar ladder truck because of Amazon and some of the other large companies' multi story units coming in. It just necessitated that we had to go out and this is being bonded because we certainly didn't have an extra million sitting around but it was the proper thing to do. On the statistics, its kind of interesting that we're still doing quite well in the portion of Reynoldsburg keeping those runs down to about 5 minutes. That's excellent response time any time and even though Jersey Township, that's the new fire station they just put in at Mink and Morse, so it's only been open probably 4 months, but already they're making an impact. We used to see these reports a year ago, it was 9-10-12 even 15 minutes to get a response up in Jersey Township so this is huge to go from that clear down to 3. Now is that just because they didn't have very many runs? Sure. Will it float up to about 5 or 6? Absolutely it will. But I think that portion of coverage has been helpful. So that was kind of the things we wanted to share. And also, when you see the mutual aid, all of the fire departments share because if someone is out on a run, you're going to go first within your own system because it's the closest, but you'll jump over to Truro and a lot of these that we've shared, Jefferson, nine that we've shared, four that they came for us. But there is a cooperation in the dispatching its a fantastic system and I know some of the other districts now that have hooked up just recently with Truro, Jefferson, Violet, they've all formed their own little group, just within the last 30 days. So that's good for all of us because that means there are going to be faster and more efficient contact for both the EMS and fire. I sure appreciate that. Thank you.

POLICE DEPARTMENT- 4TH QUARTER REPORT

Chief Plesich: Thank you. We have the 4th quarter report that is complete and I'll just hit a few highlights. It has been quite a 4th quarter for the Police Department, we were very busy. We continue with our Illumination Project which is our monthly community outreach program with 3 months of projects run, hide fight, street smart and theft awareness fraud program. We debuted our new recruiting video which has been a very popular thing. When I get phone calls from recruits and potential lateral applicants, about 99% are mentioning that video they've seen online so we're very pleased with that. We also debuted our new cruiser design, more modern design with blue lettering on the side. We hired Deputy Chief Baker. We hired 5 new police officers. We just about completed a 5 year plan for the agency. We began negotiating 3 different contracts with 3 different unions and we had a little move around of folks within our agency. We had some openings in Dispatch and Clerks and current employees took some of those positions. So we're very pleased that we got a lot accomplished in the 4th quarter. Statistic wise, traffic citations overall were up, speed citations were down and traffic crashes were up just a bit. We also have a quarter 4 goals complete with just a couple of highlights there. B company we want a lot of walking patrols and the shift averaged 160 walking patrols per month which exceeded about 4x what we were looking for. Walking patrols were concentrated in shopping

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areas and City parks in response to some complaints of thefts and vandalism that we had and so we were pretty effective in that. Adding in the elevated platform that we used for surveillance down in the retail areas, thefts from cars were way down so we're really pleased with how our officers performed in the 4th quarter. Also a follow up on a report from 2 weeks ago when I was asked about body worn cameras, we have planned 50 cameras. Ultimately the goal, if we can get to full personnel in the agency, that would give us 36 patrol officers and 6 patrol Sargents, that would be 42 and we'd have a few spare cameras around. If we make that purchase, that company will have those in our hands within 30 days, they promised me. I've written a new policy to cover the cameras. I've had my Deputy Chief review that and our next step, hopefully tomorrow, I will send that to our labor attorney to have him take a look at it. So that's all I have prepared this evening to cover on that. Are there any questions?

Mr. Spalding: I was impressed, I particularly read the strategic goals and objectives and oh my land, it's almost too much, but none the less, every single department, every single phase, but there are a couple of things that caught my attention that I really like. The one to reduce solve and prevent crime by engaging community partnerships. I think I've seen that getting better all along, but when you line these out like initiate citizens police academy. Well that's kind of cool. Share with me what that would look like.

Chief Plesich: I ran a citizens police academy in Hilliard years ago and we had a very unique program and a lot of departments will do this type of thing where they will let citizens come in and over the course of several weeks maybe six weeks they'll come in for an evening and they get trained by detectives and what detectives do. We train them in how to make traffic stops, we let them, some of them if they want to use the range for fire arms, I teach a class on search and seizure and legal basics and what the authority of police are. So we have all that stuff, but what made us unique in Hilliard, was we ended the class, the last class was a mock trial. So they got to apply everything that they had learned through the CPA academy and then we would have this mock trial and of course I'm an attorney, Curtis Baker is an attorney, so I was the prosecutor, he was the Defense attorney, and we used actual video from one of our cruisers and we let the folks vote on what the judge should rule on the case so that was kind of unique and people really loved that and it's our goal to get that done here.

Mr. Spalding: I like the one for teens, Police Camp too. That's getting them involved and learning the process and just think you've got some realistic goals that really bring people into the community to understand what you all do. I think it's extremely important.

Chief Plesich: To piggy back on that, one of the illumination projects that you should see shortly in the next 3 or 4 months will be what we're calling policing 101. We'll tell the people, here are your rights, here's what the officer is thinking on a traffic stop, here's his authority to order you out of the vehicle or order passengers out of the vehicle, just so we can sort of overcome some of the false information that is out there.

Mr. Spalding: That's good because I've seen the illumination projects and they're wonderful, I would just ask if you could keep it still very high on the website, keep it up on Facebook, leave it

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up there for a long time because there is a lot of good people in the community that will help put that out. But the more people that see it, then you'll get people attending. I think its on there for 2 days, 3 days and then it disappears. Once it's gone, people forget. So I think it's really handy to just keep reminders out there like officer Fulton and the whole team does a fantastic job with that project.

Chief Plesich: I concur. Thank you. Further questions?

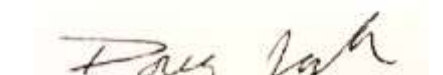
