Mr. Bowsher: Thank you Chairman Baker and other members of Council. This comes before you, this is a clean-up ordinance and repeal and replace of something that passed last Council back in December. We were awarded more dollars for the grant to have four total charging stations. Totalling about \$240,000.00. Two at the Community Center and two at the parking lot. This is to re-appropriate the money into the correct accounts and then move forward with utilizing EV and Charge Point for that construction.

Ms. Bryant: How much additional funding are we talking about?

Mr. Bowsher: We went from about 180 to about 240. So, these two additional chargers are basically dual point chargers. They take about two hours to recharge the vehicle and they are \$20,000.00 grants each.

Mr. Bryant: Thank you.

Ms. Lawson-Rowe: Will there be any additional funds that would need to be supplied from the City?

Mr. Bowsher: No. These, basically what we do is we pay for these chargers up front and then we go ahead and submit that the projects were completed and then AEP releases the money so its 100% grant match.



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Mr. Baker: I would like to move forward to council as an emergency adoption, is there a second? Second by Councilman Pyakurel.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH BUILDERSCAPE, INC. TO PERFORM IMPROVEMENTS TO JFK PARK PROJECT, APPROPRIATING FUNDS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

Ms. Bauman: Thank you Chairman Baker, members of the Committee and members of Council. On April 22nd of 2019, Council legislation authorizing the Mayor to enter into contract with EMH&T for the engineering, planning, advertising and bid document preparation for the JFK park improvements and then on November 14th and 21st it was advertised. On December 13th we held a bid opening for the project and received four bids. EMH&T reviewed the bids and made a recommendation to the City to accept Builderscape, Inc as the contractor for the JFK improvement. We are requesting authorization for the Mayor to enter into contract with Builderscape in the amount of \$1,100,913.00, plus a 10% contingency of \$110,091.00 for a total of \$1,211,004.00 and declaring an emergency to enable the contract to be awarded. We also need to appropriate funds from the unappropriated CIP fund to the JFK Park Improvement fund in the amount of the \$1,211.004.00.

Ms. Jenkins: The amount, since it was approved last year....

Ms. Bauman: It was not approved we were just given authorization to begin the process. So now I need for Council to approve that contract to allow us to award it and then to unappropriated the funds from the, to take the unappropriated funds from the CIP and appropriate them into the CIP JFK Park Improvement fund. I can read that account number if you need me to.

Ms. Bryant: So, this is going on to the 2020 budget, is that correct?

Ms. Bauman: The 2020 CIP monies.

Ms. Bryant: Ok, thank you.



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Mr. Cotner: Could you then, since we have such a nice crowd here tonight, share what these improvements are going to look like and the transformation that's going to be happening after many overdue years.

Ms. Bauman: Certainly. So, the restroom that is currently out there was built probably around 1970, give or take a few years. So that will be torn down and where the existing concession stand is, that is going to be where the new restroom and concession stand will be. It will be a little bit bigger; it's not going to be the exact same footprint. But there will be a concession stand in there with storage area for Parks and Recreation. And then there will be the restroom facility will have two family units, so you can go in if you have your daughter with you or your son. You can go in there and use the family unit. And then there will be two traditional, a men's and a women's restroom. Then there will be playground equipment for 0-5 and 5-12. I think that's the breakdown. And then we have this really neat education component, its and arch. Its motion, you can touch it and play and tag. It's all kinds of games and music. It just keeps you moving if you're in a wheelchair or if you're an elderly person. Everybody of all ages can utilize this piece of equipment. Were also going to have a lot more connectivity. Right now, when you pull up to the park you have the curb, do if you are in a wheelchair or if you have a stroller to be able to get up over that curb. So, there will be access ramps all around and pads that connect you from one portion of the playground equipment by the concession stand all the way over to the gazebo.

Ms. Jenkins: Do you have an idea of the timeline and when this will be completed?

Ms. Bauman: They will probably start in March and they said its 180 days after they start the demo. So were hoping by September. So, our baseball season will be disrupted a little bit, we will make sure we have porta johns out there to accommodate our crowds.

Mr. Salvati: Just for the record, for the crowd here and it goes along with President Jenkins question. I am assuming this is an emergency because its kinds of been drug on to this point, and we want people to be able to use this, this summer.

Ms. Bauman: And we have to award the contract within, I believe 60 days. So yes.

EMH&T will oversee all aspect of the project and perform an inspection once the project is complete. The fee for their services is \$79,535.00. And we also need to appropriate these funds from the unappropriated CIP into the JFK Park Improvement Fund.

Mr. Baker: I am going to say one thing, I am glad that this is getting done because when I took my kids to JFK I could see the years of wear and tear and it's time to replace the old and bring in the new. I do applaud you for this.

Ms. Bauman: We are very excited.

Mr. Bowsher: This is before you, this is the second piece of our legislation for the Licking County, the district 5 piece for our 2021 repaving efforts. Come before you are district 6, the Franklin County side as well. But this is a check in the box that ODOT requires up to approve that we agree with what they are doing. We have already appropriated the funds of about \$124,000 last year to go ahead and do that work. There will be one more before they start the work in 2021.

INTERNATIONAL BRAND DUMP TRUCK AND RELATED EQUIPMENT FOR
THE STREET DEPARTMENT**

Mr. Kundtz: This is asking for approval for the Mayor to enter into a contract to purchase, it would be a replacement for one of our larger salt trucks. I have been working hard on getting on a good rotation after this one, we should be on about a 15-year rotation for each truck so hopefully it looks like next year I shouldn't be coming back for any.

Ms. Strickland: What year is this particular truck?

Mr. Kundtz: I believe this is a 2007. They do, it is such a complex piece of equipment, they do normally take about 10 to 11 months to get built, get everything together. So, I am asking for emergency also.

Ms. Lawson-Rowe: So how many of the trucks do we currently have?

Mr. Kundtz: Currently our main rotation or main fleet for handling snow, we have 8 large trucks and 1 smaller truck.

Ms. Lawson-Rowe: And what's a good number to have in a City our size so that we...

Mr. Kundtz: I think we are doing great with what we have, we have a real good crew put together. We have our routine, each driver has their specific route, neighborhood, and we pride ourselves on the job that we do. We certainly appreciate having equipment to do the job.

Ms. Strickland: So, I know you mentioned about having this as an emergency, we don't have it as an emergency tonight.

Mr. Kundtz: No, two readings. I want you to be comfortable with it.

Ms. Strickland: Two readings, alright. I just wanted to make sure.



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Mr. Kundtz: Not to totally rush things along, but like I said it does take some time to get them built and get toward the head of the list for the manufactures to be built out, it helps a lot to get in the front of the line.

Ms. Bryant: Are you expecting to trade in the truck that we have or what's the ultimate expectation on that?

Mr. Kundtz: Right now I kind of left it open on the deal, again with it taking so long to be traded in, we didn't get a number, a hard number in writing to us for the trade in because we're not sure what kind of condition the truck will be yet. Hopefully it's not blown up or anything but... At least that leaves options open so we can choose to whatever is going to suite the City the best as far as funds for it.

Ms. Lawson- Rowe: So, what I am hearing is that we would be fully functional next winter with having this new piece of equipment and we aren't now?

Mr. Kundtz: No, we are right now. This would just be replacing one. We would still have the truck that would be traded in or auctioned off. It's still in our possession and useful right now. Just trying to look ahead before we start having major problems with it.

Mr. Kundtz: This is the same sort of situation, just trying to rotate the fleet through. This is a 2006, what we refer to as a bucket truck. When we met on Saturday and discussed how many traffic lights and street lights that we maintain, this is our primary truck to reach all of those. Its treating us good but would like to replace it before we start having problems.

I am truly blessed to have known all of you in various ways. I will never forget this. To those coming after us, good luck! Have fun with it.

President Joseph: I know that you weren't here a long time, two years, but you are someone who was prepared to assume the office mid-term. I know what that is like to jump into a Council seat mid-term. You don't have a long time to study the issues like people who are running for office for a year ahead. I appreciate everything that you have brought to the Council discussion. I am like that I was able to answer some of your questions. I hope that I was able to be of aid and assistance to you. You definitely were of aid to this Council and the community. Thank you for your service.

Ward 2

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Councilmember Luzader: It is actually bittersweet for me. I sat in the audience for over thirty years attending these meetings. The last four years has been a dream. I can't imagine serving my community any better. I also want to say that I am not going away. I will take my seat back out in the audience. Like Mr. Clemens, I hope to get my three minutes, more than once. Thank you for your support.

President Joseph: You have been at the Council table for four years, but you were one of the few Councilmembers that I've served with, that it felt like you had been up here the whole time you served the City. There was not a time that I did not believe that you were ready to jump right in and help. When Councilmember Clemens stepped away from committee chairmanship for a while, he did not even have to make a suggestion as I was already thinking of you. You have done an outstanding job in that position. I am glad to see that you will continue to be active in the community and Council. You bring decades of experience and insight. The new Council will be well served by your advice in the future. Thank you for your service.

Ward 3

Councilmember Spalding: The nicest thing about being up here is that it gives you opportunities. For example, the Mayor asked if I would like to take the Issue 11 campaign, because I understand business and we desperately needed more money in the City. If we wanted to do more roads, more police and all the things we are doing now, it was going to take a significant influx of new cash. Brad gave me the opportunity along with three other people to get out there and make that happen. You not only got here, but you contributed so much to the City and the service you provided to the City and so many different organizations that you serve and volunteer for including the West Licking Fire District. I served the District for six years and it is a commitment to take extra nights out of your month and discuss what needs to be done by another government entity. I thank you for not only your service on Council, but for your service on several committees, the West Licking Fire District and the whole broad experience that you brought

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to the table. It's made things so much richer and insightful for all of us when debating the issues we have to decide. I very much appreciate that.

Council President

President Joseph: I would like to make a few comments tonight about the time that I have served on City Council. I was never thinking about serving in city government or running for a city office, but I had an interest in public service. One day in September 2005, I got this phone call from former Auditor Dick Harris. He asked if I would be interested in serving on City Council. He said that the Ward 3 Councilman was retiring and we were interested to see if you might be interested in the appointment. I was looking at other things at the time, but I spent a couple of days looking at it and speaking with my wife. I decided that it was a good idea to do it. I knew the area from other activities. I sought that appointment and that Council approve that appointment. During the past fourteen plus years, there has been so many new people that have come and gone. Not just on Council, other city officials as well. I want to make it part of the record to recognize the people I served with and who me as a green, uneducated person in city government. People like Barth and Caleb, we were thrown into the process. There was very little time to get up to speed. The people that I am going to mention, I relied on. I didn't always agree with them, but I always valued what they contributed.

During those years, I have served with Mayor McCloud. He is someone that has clearly brought decades of public service to the City that we are so richer for. Both in terms of serving as Council President and Mayor. The same can be said for Mayor McPherson. I really valued his input early on. He offered to take me all around the City to show me the police department, the service department, and water department. Any place where I would have questions about how the City functioned. He offered to do that and I really appreciated it.

I have served with Mr. Hood for almost the entire time that I have been here. He was appointed City Attorney almost when I got here. I almost felt that we were on a parallel course within our City service. He is definitely someone that I respected and valued his legal views and interpretations. The one thing that I always remember is him saying if you can ask me a question with a phone call, do it. Don't send me an email. I have largely followed that. Mr. Hood, I really appreciate your service to the City.

Prior to him, I briefly served with Mr. Underwood, who was really an institution her at the City when he retired. I forget how many years he served. I do remember reading that he

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wrote our City Charter and served as our Attorney once it was approved. He was a valued asset during the short time that I had to work with him.

He have had an outstanding group of auditors since I came here. Mr. Cicak has been a visionary during his short time serving here. I really don't know of anyone in an administrative position that has done so much in so little time. He has really done great things for the City. Not just in the Auditor's office, but he also served on Council. He was someone who wanted to get things done for the City. He took a leadership role and I really appreciated that.

Prior to him was City Auditor Dick Harris. If it were not for him, I never would have sought this Council position in the first place. Someone that I leaned on for many, many years. Briefly before he took his position in 2007, I served briefly with Howard Whitney, who served only a few months before I served my seat.

Council could not function without the person sitting at the end of the table. Our current Clerk is Mollie Prasher. We had a great crew that interviewed for this position earlier this year. I have interviewed and hired people in other facets of my life. She impressed me so much right out of the gate. I fought for her appointment and Council approved it. I knew if Council was largely replace this year, I wanted someone in that job, who could keep the trains running without batting an eye. I am very confident that is going to happen. Prior to her, we had another outstanding clerk, April Beggerow. When she told me that she was looking to move on, I almost felt like locking her office. She was another great one. I mentioned to my wife that you two really have something in common. You are basically workaholics. You think five to six steps ahead. April would have something done before I even asked for it. She was an outstanding clerk for five years. Her predecessor was Nancy Frazier, who served as clerk for twenty-six years. All of the other people I am going to mention and probably the City officials, could not have done their jobs without her incredible knowledge of City affairs. The joke was that she knew where all of the bodies were buried. I am glad to see that she is still active in the community.

When Councilmember Cotner sought the appointment for the At-Large seat, he really rose to the top among a number of candidates. At that time, Council was convinced that a person with his community activities, leadership in the private sector, and his volunteer activities could bring a lot to Council. During the period he has served here, both as President Pro Tempora and Finance chair, I don't know what we would have done without his steady hand on so many issues that have come to Council. Thank you for what you have done and how

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you have helped me as well. Prior to Councilmember Cotner, the seat was held by Toni Newman. She was on Council when I was appointed, but is now deceased. She was another person that really thought about every angle of a position. She really added so much to our City.

Councilmember Baker has been here two years. You are an example of someone who quickly dove into the issues concerning the City - asking questions, taking chances on legislation that might not be popular, but is worthy of debate or maybe even a vote. I appreciate your thinking outside of the box during your time here bringing forth issues. I appreciate it very much. Prior to Councilmember Baker, Councilmember Long sat in that seat for eight years. He is now a Truro Township trustee. Prior to him, was Councilmember Shirey. I worked closely with her following my appointment. Prior to that, Mr. Beougher was a Councilmember. He was a strong supporter of my initial appointment. I was glad to lean on him for the Charter Review Commission.

The final At-Large seat that is held by Councilmember Bryant. She is not here tonight and I understand why she is not here. It is tough to recover from surgery. Despite our differences on policy issues, there is a reason why I asked that Kristin Bryant sit here next to me when she and Mr. Baker were elected. That's because I valued having an attorney sitting next to me. There were times when I would say, what do you think about this? Can we really do this? She has been a real asset during the years that she had been here. Prior to her service, Councilmember Dan Skinner sat in that seat, an attorney that I leaned on quite frequently. Prior that, we had a number of people who came through that seat quite quickly. Monica DeBrock served for a period after being appointed. Councilmember Nathan Bird held the sit as well. When I was first appointed, it was held by Councilmember Stake.

For two years, Caleb Skinner has held the Ward 1 seat. He has been an asset to Council during his time. Prior to that, current Auditor Cicak held that position. Again, someone who dove into City issues and made a difference. Before that, Councilmember Barrett held that position for four years. He was not a long term. He wanted to come here and accomplish some things and then let someone else take over. Before that, Councilmember Fred Deskins held that seat and before that, Councilmember Preston Stearns, who is here tonight. Glad to see you here.

Ward 2, with Councilmember Luzader and the value he has brought to the City and how he has helped me. Prior to his service, Councilmember Leslie Kelly held that seat. She is another individual who, coming from her educational background, was always pushing us to

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do cooperative things with the school district, which I think was a plus. Prior to her, Councilmember Brett Baxter held the seat for a couple of years. He was another one of those people, who if I did not know what we were doing, I could ask him and he always helped or had an answer to a questions.

Councilmember Spalding in Ward 3, I again, appreciate your service and everything that you have done during your service here. Prior to Councilmember Spalding, Councilmember Cornelius McGrady held that seat. Again, much like Councilmember Baker was someone who pushed the envelope asking Council to discuss things. Not necessarily pass things, but bring things to the table for discussion. He had distinguished service on the West Licking Fire District as well. I served six and one half years in that seat prior to Councilmember McGrady.

Lastly, we have Councilmember Clemens, who sat in that seat my entire fourteen years and three months. As I mentioned earlier, how much it meant to me that he got me to the point where I was actually contributing something to discussions.

The last person that I want to mention is the last person that sat in my seat prior to my becoming Council President, Williams Hills. Bill Hills was already on Council for many years prior to my appointment. He sat in this seat for eight years and prior to that he served ten years in the seat currently held by Councilmember Cotner. Everything and anything that I have done during my eight years at President of Council, I really did look to Mr. Hills as someone who was fair to everyone, in both parties. The position of President of Council is really very different than the other seats here. The other seat up here are more policy oriented. They make the decisions, set and direction and vote on it. Except for voting in the event of a tie, which I have done maybe twenty or twenty-five times during my time here, the job of President of Council is mostly administrative. I like to say that he is a traffic cop. He makes sure that everything gets done without any mistakes or accidents. I am not perfect, I've made plenty of mistakes myself, but I've tried to pride myself that when Council does something, we follow the right procedure, procedure and that it is done the right way. I've become a lot less partisan because of being in this job and understand that there are a lot of people here that would like to make a contribution to the City and my job was to make sure that they could do that. I hope that I was able to do that during my years on City Council. With that, I will conclude my comments. I appreciate the opportunity to serve this great City and with the great leaders both past and present. Thank you.

WHEREAS, the 2018 Franklin County Energy Study found that transportation accounts for over 40% of total energy used and more than 50% is wasted energy and sets a target of a countywide 10% electric vehicle adoption rate of 2030; and

WHEREAS, AEP offers a Commercial Electric Vehicle Charging Station Incentive Grant program that will cover 100% of the cost of the equipment, installation, and maintenance with the City being responsible for the upfront costs.

SECTION 2. That ~~\$50,000.00~~119,562.00 be appropriated from the Capital Improvement Project Fund to account 410.000.0162.5602 – Land Improvements for the installation of two (2) units at the East Main Street/Lancaster Avenue Green Space/Parking Lot project ~~with \$138,852.00 coming from the existing community center account 410.000.0148.5659.~~ That upon reimbursement to the City of Reynoldsburg from AEP, all upfront funds spent will be returned to the CIP fund.

SECTION 3: That \$120,717.00 be appropriated from the Capital Improvement Project Fund to account 410.000.0148.5659 Reynoldsburg Community Center YMCA for the installation of two (2) units at the Reynoldsburg Community Center YMCA. That upon reimbursement

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 505 ANIMALS AND FOWL, SECTION 505.11 KILLING OR INJURING ANIMALS AND REPEAL SECTIONS 505.13 POISONING ANIMALS AND 505.15 CRUELTY TO ANIMALS OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG, OHIO

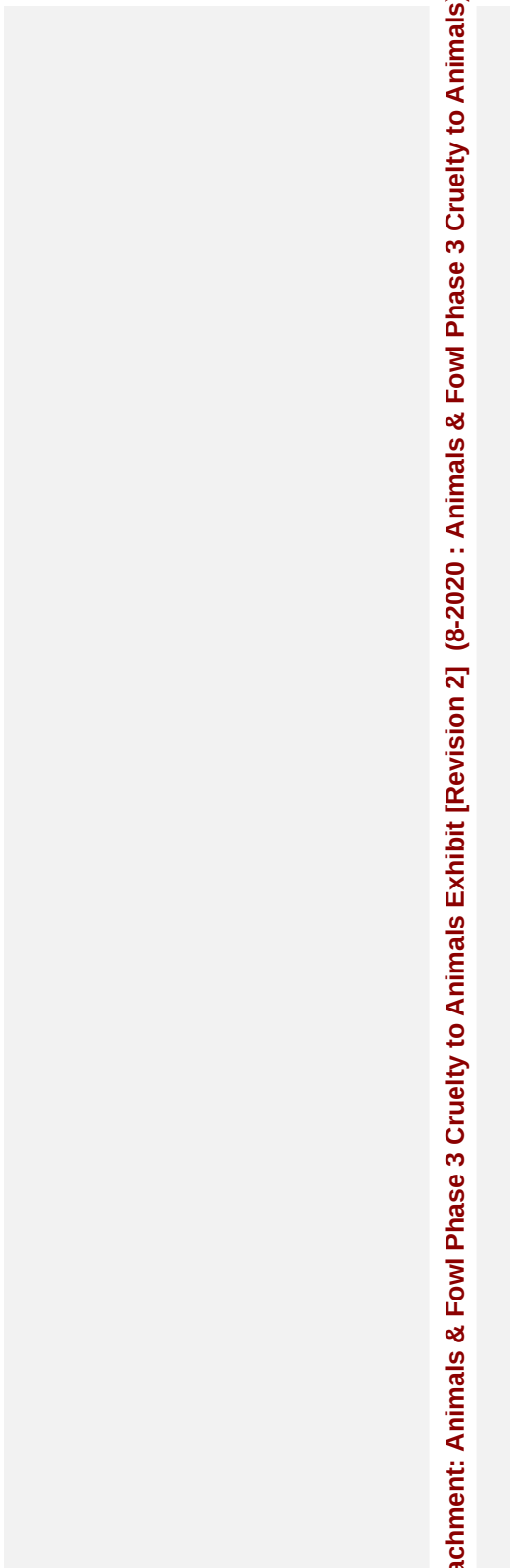

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 505 ANIMALS AND FOWL, SECTION 505.37 DANGEROUS DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS AND TO ADD SECTION 505.13 TETHERING ANIMALS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG, OHIO

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 505 ANIMALS AND FOWL, Section 505.37 Dangerous Dogs and other Animals be amended in the Code of Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg be and is hereby attached as Exhibit A.

SECTION 2. That Section 505.13 Tethering Animals be added to Chapter 505 ANIMALS AND FOWL of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg.

SECTION 3. That upon adoption by Council, this ordinance shall be in effect thirty days following the signature by the Mayor.

505.13 TETHERING ANIMALS.

(a) No person shall tether an animal in any of the following circumstances:

(1) For more than six (6) hours total in a twenty-four (24) hour period and not more than two (2) unsupervised consecutive hours with no less than a one (1) hour period between tetherings;

(2) Between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. other than short, not to exceed 15 20 minutes, periods, ~~for the animal to relieve itself;~~

(3) When a heat or cold advisory has been issued by a local or state authority or the National Weather Service;

(4) When a severe weather warning has been issued by a local or state authority or the National Weather Service;

(5) When the tether is less than ~~twenty~~ ten (2010) feet in length;

(6) When the tether allows the animal to come within fifteen (15) feet of a sidewalk or within ten (10) feet of a property line;

(7) When the tether is attached by means of a pinch-type, prong-type, of choke-type collar or if the collar is unsafe or is not properly fitted;

(8) When the tether may cause injury or entanglement;

(9) When the tether is made of a material that is unsuitable for the animal's size and weight or that causes any unnecessary discomfort to the animal;

(10) When no owner or occupant is present at the premises;

(b) As used in this section, "tether" means a rope, chain, cord, dog run or pulley, or similar restraint for holding an animal in place, allowing a radius in which it can move about.

(c) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor on the first offense, a misdemeanor of the fourth degree on the second offense, and a misdemeanor of the first degree on the third or any subsequent offense. Notwithstanding the foregoing penalties, if an animal becomes sick or injured as a result of this section, then whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree.

505.37 DANGEROUS DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS; PERMIT REQUIRED; FEE; IMPOUNDING.

(a) In addition to registration of a dog as required by Section 505.07 and Ohio R.C. Sections 955.03 and 955.09, the owner, keeper or harbinger of a dangerous dog ~~or other~~

~~dangerous animal~~ as defined in 505.01(b) shall pay a permit fee to own, keep or harbor a dangerous dog to the City of Reynoldsburg and obtain the permit from the Chief of Police at a cost **set in the City's fee schedule** ~~of thirty dollars (\$30.00)~~ for such permit in addition to the payment of any fee for registration of the dog as required by the Ohio Revised Code and these Codified Ordinances.

(1) The owner, keeper, or harbinger of such dangerous dog ~~or dangerous animal~~ shall pay for the permit at the Reynoldsburg City Auditor's Office and receive a receipt. The receipt shall be presented to the Chief of Police in order to obtain a permit.

(b) (1) The permit to own, keep or harbor a dangerous dog ~~or dangerous animal~~ shall be valid only during the calendar year in which the permit is issued, and during the first twenty days of the following calendar year.

(2) The permit fee for any dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~ is **set in the City's fee schedule** ~~thirty dollars (\$30.00)~~ if purchased prior to July 1st of any calendar year. If the permit is purchased on or after July 1st of any calendar year, the permit fee is **half the rate set in the City's fee schedule** ~~fifteen dollars (\$15.00)~~.

(c) No owner, keeper or harbinger of a dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~, as defined in section 505.01(b), shall fail to publicly display a sign on the premises where the dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~ is kept or harbored that notifies the public of the presence of a dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~ on the property of the owner, keeper or harbinger. The owner, keeper or harbinger of the dog shall provide such sign which shall contain, in lettering that is at least two inches in height, the statement "caution, beware of dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~" or other statement that provides reasonable notice of the presence of a dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~ on the premises.

(d) No person shall own, keep, or harbor any dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~, as defined in section 505.01 (b) without registering and obtaining a permit as required in divisions (a) and (b) of this section for such dangerous dog ~~or other dangerous animal~~.

(e) **Any owner, keeper or harbinger of any dangerous dog as defined in division 505.01(b), shall provide satisfactory evidence of the fact that the dangerous dog has been neutered or spayed.** ~~Whoever violates division (c) or (d) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree and the animal control officer shall seize and impound the dangerous dog or other dangerous animal in the municipality that is not properly confined or restrained, pursuant to Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D), until such time as the owner, keeper or harbinger of the dangerous dog or other dangerous animal demonstrates compliance with Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D). If the owner does not comply with the provisions of Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D) within three (3) days of such seizure, then the dangerous dog or other dangerous animal shall be humanely destroyed.~~

(f) ~~Any~~ No owner, keeper, or harbinger of a dangerous dog or other dangerous animal, as defined in division 505.01(b), shall ~~provide satisfactory evidence of the fact that the dog has been permanently identified by means of a microchip and the dog's microchip number.~~ refuse to permit the routine inspection of such dangerous dog or other dangerous animal on the premises of the same by the animal control officer, police officer, or other person authorized by the mayor or police chief, county board of health or an employee or agent thereof, to insure compliance with the divisions contained herein or any provision of the Ohio revised code, nor conceal such dangerous dog or other dangerous animal from the animal control officer, police officer or other person authorized by the mayor or police chief, or county board of health, or an employee or agent thereof, attempting to accomplish such inspection.

(g) ~~No owner, keeper or harbinger of a dangerous dog or other dangerous animal, as defined in division 505.01(b) shall fail to report to the city animal control officer or a police officer the theft or loss of a dangerous dog or other dangerous animal within five hours of the discovery of the theft or loss.~~ Whoever violates division (c), (d), (e) or (f) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree and the animal control officer shall seize and impound the dangerous dog in the municipality that is not properly confined or restrained, pursuant to Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D), until such time as the owner, keeper or harbinger of the dangerous dog demonstrates compliance with Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D). If the owner does not comply with the provisions of Ohio R.C. 955.22(A) to (D) within three (3) days of such seizure, then the dangerous dog shall be humanely destroyed.

(h) ~~Whoever violates divisions (f) or (g) is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.~~ No owner, keeper or harbinger of a dangerous dog as defined in division 505.01(b) shall fail to report to the city animal control officer or a police officer the theft or loss of a dangerous dog within five hours of the discovery of the theft or loss.

(i) Whoever violates division (h) is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.
