Mayor Begeny

The City of Reynoldsburg has been awarded the OPWC Phase 2 grant for our Main Street improvements. This project is from Jackson to Graham/Waggoner Road. Improvements will include some storm sewer upgrades that haven't been touched since the 1930's as well as curbs, sidewalks and lighting. It's a 2.9-million-dollar project and we received 1.97, 1.4 million in grant funds and \$500,000.00 in a 0% interest loan. The cost to the City will be about \$900,000.00. Its significantly less than Phase 1 because it is not going to include narrowing the streets. It was great news to hear that and I wanted to be able to share.

I have even better news to share. I am here to recognize someone tonight who is on our zoom call. She is near and dear to our member's heart. In recognition of Ruth Marilyn Lawson and her 80th birthday. Tonight, I am going to read a proclamation.

While there she helped to establish Human Relations Sunday, which is celebrated the Sunday before Martin Luther King, Jr. Day; and

WHEREAS, she has been an active member of the United Methodist Church since she was a child. She is currently a member of Covenant UMC where she has spent the last 10 years as the church secretary; and

WHEREAS, Ruth is a devoted mother to two children, grandmother to four grandchildren, and great-grandmother to two great-grandchildren.

They will be looking at building a small but generous size facility there on the parcel. I am sure that Messiah Lutheran has other abilities there for the buildings that are currently on there that could be utilized as tapping into the sewer and water that is pretty much what I know at this time.

An Ordinance to Approve the Final Plat Plan for the Spring Hill Farm Development

Director Bowsher

This is a motion for approval by the Planning Commission. This is phase 1 of 4 of the approved development on Waggoner Road for the MI Homes development Spring Hill Farms. This is roughly about 75 homes and is phase 1. We will have to do this 3

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more times. By state law it goes to Planning Commission first then it goes to you. What your doing is, the City engineer has already taken a look at this, they have accepted it. Planning Commission has accepted it. Once your final approval is made it will go to the County Recorder and Auditor to create those actual parcels for this plat map and be recorded.

Councilmember Baker motions to forward the Ordinance to Council for a first read. Second by Councilmember Pyakurel. Motion carries.

Finance & Administration Committee

This is the Finance and Administration Committee Meeting for December 14, 2020.

An Ordinance to Make Appropriations for Expenses and Other Expenditures of the City of Reynoldsburg, State of Ohio, During the Fiscal Year Ending December 31, 2021

Mayor Begeny

A couple quick comments on the budget. After review with the Auditors Office as well as outside Council, the budget comes before you this evening. The only thing that is not included in the budget right now is the potential for use for CIC funds. Outside of that, the budget stands for you and if you have questions myself or the directors will be able to answer.

Councilmember Strickland

Can you explain to me a little more what the plans for the CIC fund are?

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Mayor Begeny

Absolutely. As you know, Council approved the creation of a CIC or Community Investment Corporation and as you know what our plans are is to kind of go through a process where we will have members from Council as well as outside individuals come in and have a meeting after the first of the year. We have been and agreed to by the Auditor to find a different bank than the one we have been using which is Heartland bank. Once the board is established, we will bring them together and have a meeting and then evaluate the potential for whatever bank that we go to. Identify some that will come from the general fund and then we will come back to Council and discuss it with you.

Director Bowsher

The CIC in short term is called the Community Investment Corporation. We have had one for a while. This was enacted a long time back in 19. To help out with improvement and growth. So, the goal in doing this is to create small business loans and land reutilization in better words a land bank. Development finance structures and deals. Those are the main functions we will be utilizing moving forward. For us we are still deciding on how we are going to fund it year after year. We have talked about bed tax and JEDDs. I think we will narrow it down in the short term. Clearly, we need some seed money as we move forward. After having a meeting, we had last week with the Auditors office, Mayor and myself and we would set an earmarked value in January and we would push in front of you to appropriate those funds and therefore wanted to separate that and launch it. That's how we are going to do it. What we are going to look at is the Mayor and I have taken a look at a couple individuals that we would like to put on that board. A local developer that will be doing some work in the area, Time Spencer. The CEO and president of Dynalab, Gary James. As two. We will be looking at Tom Schottenstein for the Schottenstein corporation who owns the old Kroger. There is a lot of Development potential in that area. We will be naming a fourth, potentially what we are looking for is one of the finance managers from the bank, we select that fourth member. It will be a 7-board member total. Then the Mayor sits on it as an elected official and two members from Council. I will let you guys duke it out amongst yourselves as to who will be on there and then 3 non-voting members, myself, as the Director for the CIC, the auditor and the City Attorney. Both because of their subject matter experts in various fields will help the CIC move smoothly along. That's kind of the break down and function of the CIC. There are some bi-laws that we had our outside firm draft for us. The board will have to vote on those. It is a political subdivision.

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Councilmember Baker

Will there be money in the budget so we can get our website up to date?

Mayor Begeny

Yes. The website has been a constant conversation piece for the last few months and we did allocate funding for that. Earlier on, in January of last year, we met with the person who is responsible for our website. To give you an idea of why the website it is the way it is. Our website is very secure but not user friendly. There are not a lot of options that we can use with it. Pending Council's approval, we are going to look at other community websites and find things that are more user friendly. If it's just looking at things online or an opportunity to get more information out there. One example would be the City of Whitehall, they have a very good website that is user friendly as well as good information, as far as City issues, personnel, who to talk to and things like that. We are taking comments from directors as well as looking at other sites and of course we would like suggestions that you may have with that.

Councilmember Baker

I wanted to make sure that there is money going into our sidewalk program account so that we can start getting sidewalks implemented in areas where there are no sidewalks and fixing the areas where some have crumbled.

Mayor Begeny

Yes, there are a couple option with it. Director Dorman and I have talked about a couple philosophical changes to what we are going to do. With the help of the City Attorney and engineering firm, when putting out road bids in January, one of the things we will be including with that will be sidewalks within the area itself. One of the roads being looked at is Taylor Mills Place. So, when the engineers go out to do their early work, they are going to survey the sidewalks within that area and if any of them are in need of repair then they will be allocated at that point in time. As the Service Department moves through out to fix those roads. Those areas of sidewalks will be taken care of. The other part that you mentioned is those sidewalks that go to nowhere. I know there is one at an empty space between Retton and Brice Road. There is another one at the area of Palmer and Graham, in front of Livingston house. We are going to try and take one per year and finish those off, depending on of course cost and location. The extension by Palmer in front of Livingston house is going to be longer than some of the others because we have the bridge in there as well. But we are going to try and take one at time and do a project every year. We do have

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approximately \$890,000.00 in our sidewalk fund, so obviously we want to be judicious and strategic about how we use it in order to finish off some those sidewalks.

Councilmember Baker

There is no reason anywhere is Reynoldsburg should not have sidewalks.

Mayor Begeny

For any future development that comes into the City, they have to provide those multi use path or something along those lines. It will be included in any of their designs. So there is not going to be anything in there we have to pick up after the fact.

Councilmember Bryant

The part on Graham Road in front of the Livingston House is going to get done this year?

Mayor Begeny

Correct.

Councilmember Bryant

Ok. That is definitely a safety concern. I think we have all seen various post about where we have got people in wheel chairs and how to get around traffic. I am pleased to hear that. Are we getting any funding from the County to help?

Mayor Begeny

That's our hope. We have reached out and talked to them earlier this year to get a cost estimate. The Franklin County Engineer is going to be a guest on my 12 o'clock show in a couple of weeks and I'm sure that subject will come up.

Councilmember Bryant

We do have a number of places, I would just encourage some more collaboration with the County, because they do have money to spend. The last time I had a conversation with some of the commissioners, they indicated that they do want to help us. Commissioner Brown in particular has a fondness for walk ability as much as Councilmember Pyakurel and we need to make a lot more strides in that department. Let's try to coordinate with them and see if we can get more funding. One of the things that I think we need to look at is also we have had some conversation about

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speed tables in the past. I met with Director Dorman and I think we need to start looking at that in all of our infrastructure projects. We have got some roads through town that are widely sped on. Priestly, Rosehill, Haft, Brice, Kingsley. I think that is something we need to start investing in because we can only ask the Chief to have his officers out at so many locations at so many times. They are not there 24/7, I think the reality is we have escalating bad driving through town and I don't want to see it come down to something tragic. I think we need to find a way to fit that in to the budgeting to the new roads going forward.

Mayor Begeny

I am all for sharing resources and funding from Franklin County. I am sure the auditor will agree with me on that.

Councilmember Baker

You forgot your fiber-optics concerns.

Councilmember Bryant

I talked to Director Dorman about that. Safety first.

Councilmember Pyakurel

Last Thursday I was invited to speak at the Ohio Traders Office. They asked a question about what is the need for Reynoldsburg. I brought forward the sidewalks and streets among other issues. Maybe there is funding from the state available in the future. Various towns, City's, smaller cities. Just wanted to inform you.

Mayor Begeny

Our primary state representative Rich Brown, for the Franklin County side of Reynoldsburg, he and I have had talks in the past. AS they get ready to begin the budget negotiations for the state level. Depending on how much money they have set aside and funding for other things that can go into the budget. I know he and I will have those conversations. Canal Winchester was the recipient of some good raises, the last time around. I think he tries to rotate during those two-year budget cycles to all of the communities. I know Whitehall has gotten some different funding as well so I will definitely be advocating for Reynoldsburg as well. I am sure that we can put together some pretty good idea for how those funds should operate. And thank you for your continued assistance on this, it's a great thing Councilmember Pyakurel.

Our small businesses are the backbone of the community and in their time of need I was very proud that we were able to come together as a community and provide what we did for them and I thank the members of the committee for the selections.

Councilmember Salvati

Yes. I am pretty pleased with how all the CARES act money worked out in the end. Not just this, but the way we appropriated the rest of it all.

Councilmember Lawson-Rowe

It was heartwarming and exciting to see how our City took care of all our business owners from large to small. Small businesses that didn't even know where the City building, Mayor's office was located, were recipients of those funds and that's just because we had created relationships and we had communication and that was full circle.

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Councilmember Pyakurel

For clarification, we are asking for an emergency because the money has to be used by the end of the year?

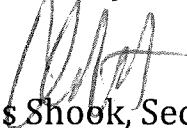

The portfolio yield slipped to 0.93% from 0.95% as maturities are reinvested in the current market environment. The weighted average maturity held at 2.5 years with roughly 30% of the portfolio maturing beyond three years, in-line with current strategy.

Interest rates remain low with the 2 year US Treasury currently yielding 0.14% and the 5 year US Treasury currently yielding 0.38% per barrons.com.

The Fed meets later this month and market expectations are for the fed funds target to remain in the range of 0.0%-0.25%. 3rd quarter GDP rebounded by 33.1% as lockdowns were lifted.

While the unemployment rate has improved to 6.7%, roughly 15 million folks continue to rely upon unemployment assistance during these uncertain times. Expectations remain for a slow recovery.

30-year Treasury constant maturity series was discontinued on February 18, 2002 and reintroduced on February 9, 2006. From February 18, 2002 to February 8, 2006, Treasury published alternatives to a 30-year rate. See Long-Term Average Rate for more information.

Treasury discontinued the 20-year constant maturity series at the end of calendar year 1986 and reinstated that series on October 1, 1993. As a result, there are no 20-year rates available for the time period January 1, 1987 through September 30, 1993.

Treasury Yield Curve Rates: These rates are commonly referred to as "Constant Maturity Treasury" rates, or CMTs. Yields are interpolated by the Treasury from the daily yield curve. This curve, which relates the yield on a security to its time to maturity is based on the closing market bid yields on actively traded Treasury securities in the over-the-counter market. These market yields are calculated from composites of indicative, bid-side market quotations (not actual transactions) obtained by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York at or near 3:30 PM each trading day. The CMT yield values are read from the yield curve at fixed maturities, currently 1, 2, 3 and 6 months and 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 10, 20, and 30 years. This method provides a yield for a 10 year maturity, for example, even if no outstanding security has exactly 10 years remaining to maturity.

Treasury Yield Curve Methodology: The Treasury yield curve is estimated daily using a cubic spline model. Inputs to the model are primarily indicative bid-side yields for on-the-run Treasury securities. Treasury reserves the option to make changes to the yield curve as appropriate and in its sole discretion. See our Treasury Yield Curve Methodology page for details.

Negative Yields and Nominal Constant Maturity Treasury Series Rates (CMTs): At times, financial market conditions, in conjunction with extraordinary low levels of interest rates, may result in negative yields for some Treasury securities trading in the secondary market. Negative yields for Treasury securities most often reflect highly technical factors in Treasury markets related to the cash and repurchase agreement markets, and are at times unrelated to the time value of money.

At such times, Treasury will restrict the use of negative input yields for securities used in deriving interest rates for the Treasury nominal Constant Maturity Treasury series (CMTs). Any CMT input points with negative yields will be reset to zero percent prior to use as inputs in the CMT derivation. This decision is consistent with Treasury not accepting negative yields in Treasury nominal security auctions.

In addition, given that CMTs are used in many statutorily and regulatory determined loan and credit programs as well as for setting interest rates on non-marketable government securities, establishing a floor of zero more accurately reflects borrowing costs related to various programs.

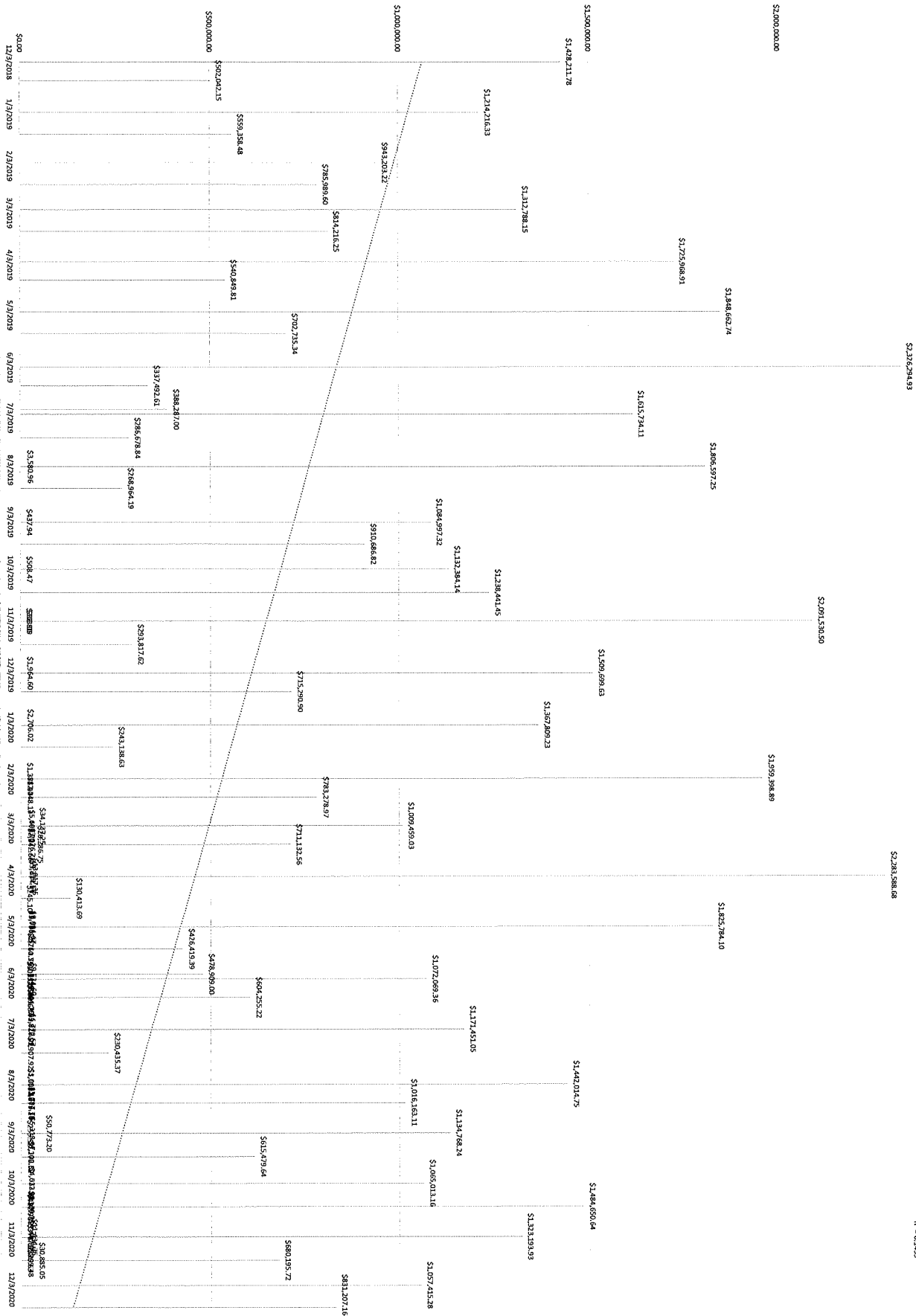

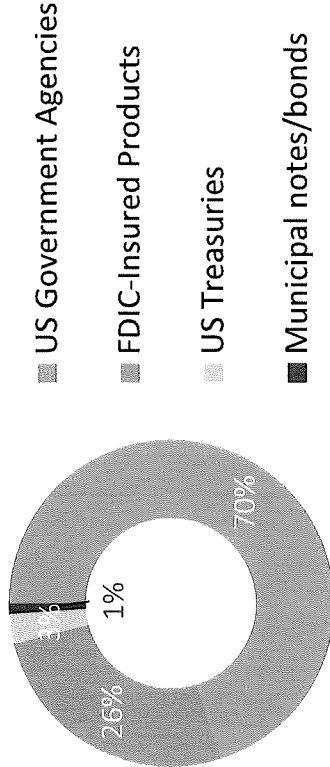

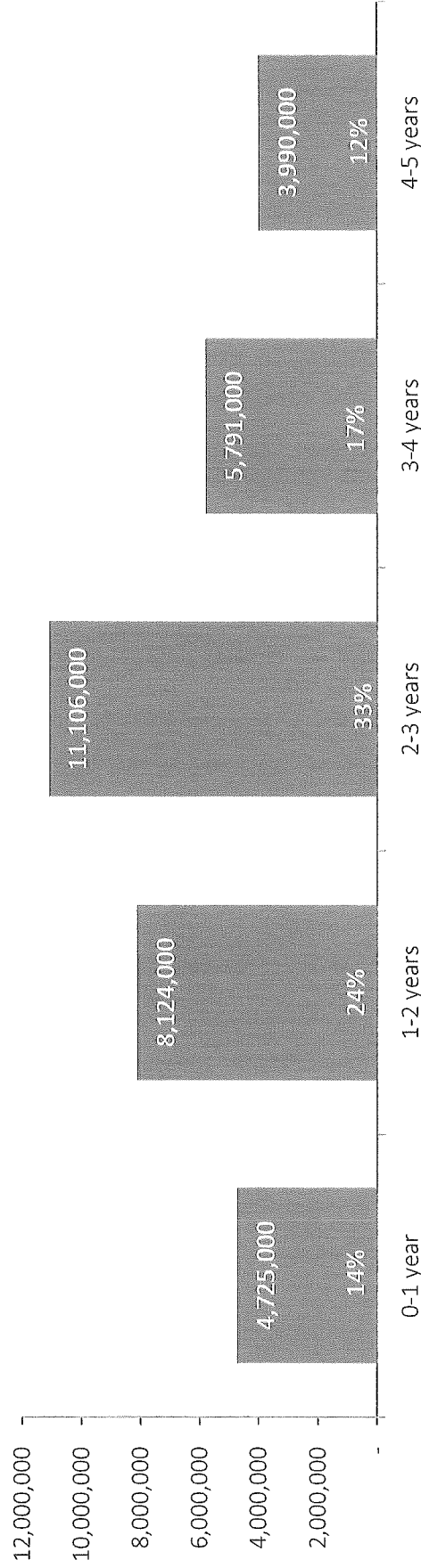

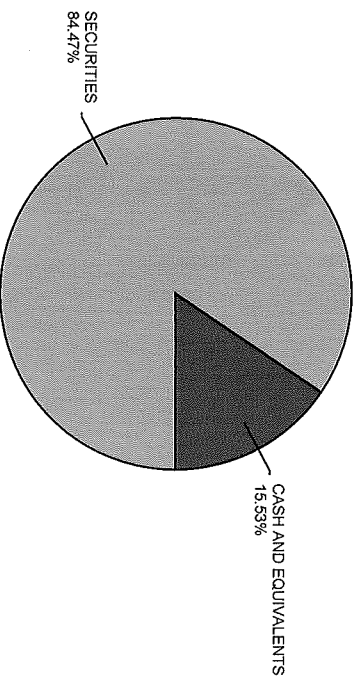

Former Councilmember Cornelius McGrady wanted to present this information to Council and request that Council consider making Reynoldsburg a human trafficking free zone. He would also like Council to approve a resolution expressing the same. He has provided a packet of information explaining the proposal and outlining the need.



THE FACTS

THE TRUTH ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- There is no single profile for trafficking victims. Victims are: males and females, adults and children, U.S. citizens and foreign nationals, the well educated and those with no formal education.
- Why don't they run away? Victims of human trafficking are often: Isolated, experiencing traumatic bonding/Stockholm syndrome, under threat of exposure, subjected to the use and threat of violence against the victim or their loved ones, or in debt bondage.
- Trafficking does not require travel. Although transportation may be involved as a control mechanism to keep victims in unfamiliar places, it is not a required element of the trafficking definition. Smuggling is a crime against a country's borders; trafficking is a crime against a person.
- Victims don't self-identify as victims of human trafficking. They do not immediately seek help or self-identify as victims due to a variety of factors, including lack of trust, self-blame, or specific instructions by the traffickers regarding how to behave when talking to law enforcement or social services.
- We estimate over 100,000 children are trafficked for sex in the United States, with conservative estimates identifying 10% - 15% of them as boys.

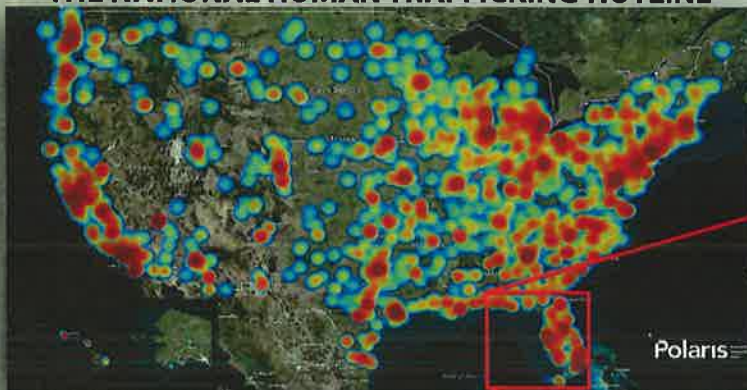


THE U.S. LEADS ALL OTHER NATIONS IN THE CONSUMPTION OF TRAFFICKED GOODS/VICTIMS

TECHNOLOGY

In collaboration with Seattle Against Slavery, the TraffickingFree Zone program targets online sex buyers through advertising and social media campaigns with 99% accuracy, and employs numerous disruption techniques to interrupt the online sex buying process. In addition, online campaigns targeting potential victims, parents of potential victims, and professionals who work with children run throughout the TraffickingFree Zone program.

TECH TOOLS

INTERCEPT BOTS



Typically, when law enforcement runs a cyber sting operation, it takes significant time, personnel and money to work through the data and arrest sex buyers. With the intercept bots, much of that process is automated. Intercept bots are used in collaboration with local law enforcement and are attached to the fake ads posted online as part of a cyber sting operation. The bot, posing as an individual looking to receive money for sex, communicates directly with all responders to the ad. During communication, the bot collects data from the sex buyers and sends it to law enforcement, eventually ending the conversation by informing the sex buyers that they have been communicating with a robot, that law enforcement has their information, and sends them resources for rehabilitation programs. Data collected about the sex buyer may contain their name, phone, address, cell carrier, place of employment, city, zip code, and more.



SEARCH ADS CAMPAIGNS

Seattle Against Slavery begins the online search ads campaign by researching the local area, gathering information on local websites selling sex, and keywords associated with the location. Between twenty and thirty ads are created with the location-specific keywords and disseminated to the internet, making around 10,000 impressions throughout the campaign.



SOCIAL MEDIA CAMPAIGNS

Using data collected from previous sting operations, Seattle Against Slavery can identify an online sex buyer's social media profile with 99% accuracy. Twenty to thirty social media ads are created and customized to the location, and disseminated on both Facebook and Instagram, making around 100,000 impressions throughout the campaign.



VICTIM SUPPORT REACH OUT

Online ads selling sex typically have a phone number listed for the sex buyers to call or text to arrange the 'date'. By scraping those phone numbers, a list is compiled of potential victims of human trafficking, and a text message and/or phone calling campaign can be conducted, to reach out directly to potential victims and connect them with local services.



DETERRENCE WEBSITE

The website to which all the ad campaigns point, which details the harm, consequences and alternatives of buying sex. Local resources and contact information are provided, encouraging sex buyers to get the help they need.

SUSTAINABLE

Unfortunately, most safe home programs in the United States close in the first year of operations due to a lack of sustainable funds. The U.S. Institute Against Human Trafficking **Boys Safe Home** program has been developed based upon one of the most successful safe home programs in the country, creating a viable and sustainable financial model.

The majority of funding for our boys home is derived from state child welfare programs. This ensures the program's longevity, while maintaining an extraordinarily high level quality of care.



THE HOME

The U.S. Institute Against Human Trafficking **Boys Safe Home** is one of the first safe homes for boys in the United States, dedicated to the care of male victims of sex trafficking under the age of 18.

While conservative estimates project that 10% - 15% of trafficked children in America are boys, other studies show up to 50%. The reality is that no one knows the real number, but it represents a significant proportion and are in need of specialized services to help.

THE PROGRAM

The home offers a critically important trauma-based care program. Although developed as a six to nine month program, we allow children to stay as long as necessary to receive proper care.

Located in an undisclosed location in Central Florida, the boys home is designed to serve any biologically born male under 18, regardless of where they identify on the gender spectrum. This is an important due to some projections citing that up to 50% of trafficked biologically born males are transgender. Each child has their own bedroom and bathroom in the home, enabling a unique program focus.

HELP NEEDED

RE 2021-2022 Streetscape Landscape Contract

Please see attached the bids from Yard Solutions, Inc. and Grass Groomers, Inc. The recommendation from the Parks and Recreation Department is to accept the bid received from Yard Solutions, Inc. The Main Street corridor is the most visible entranceway into our City.

Yard Solutions, Inc. is higher than Grass Groomers, Inc. by \$4,194.91 per year. This total includes both alternate bid items and the bid amount for the landscape.

Our recommendation is based on the following:

- We are still in the recovery phase from previous years of mismanagement of the contract. Yard Solutions has made great strides in improving the appearance and health of our plants, shrubs and trees.
- Due to the costs associated with insecticides we are of the opinion that Grass Groomers, Inc. did not adequately price the material needed to stay on top of and in some cases ahead of the scale insect. This includes removal and preventative treatment.
- History has shown us that taking the lowest bidder for the landscape contract has proven to be a disservice to maintaining a healthy and attractive landscape.
- Yard Solutions, Inc. submitted a completed bid book including work experience/references. Grass Groomers, Inc. did not submit a completed bid book, they submitted four (4) pages; no work experience/references.
- Yard Solutions, Inc. submitted detailed information on each different bid specification; which allows us to know they took into account the details of our specific project.

It is our recommendation to City Council to accept the two year bid for 2021 and 2022 for landscaping services for Streetscape submitted by Yard Solutions, Inc. in the amount of \$179,661.82 (\$89,830.91 per year). This includes the alternate bid items. This service has been included in the Parks and Recreation 2021 budget.

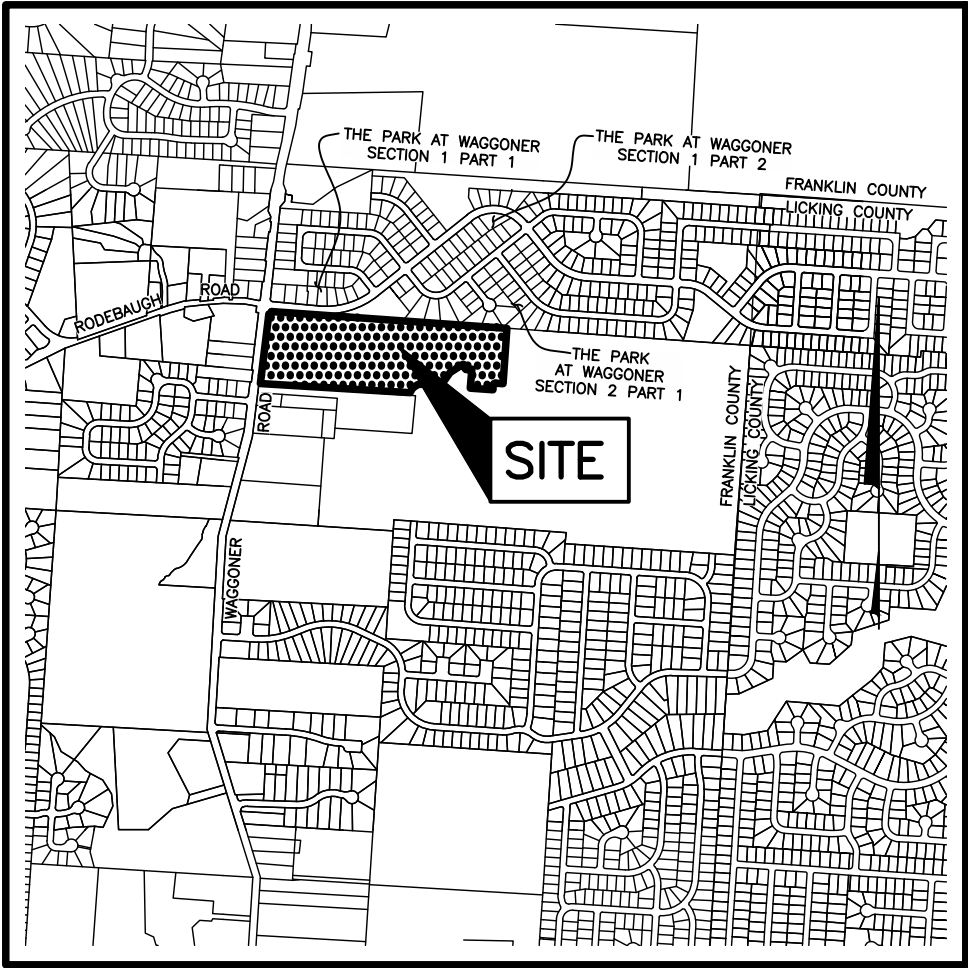

Mr. Zollars: So let's go to new business application. 2020-5514. Can you set this up for us, please?

Ms. Wheeler: Yeah, this is just the final plot for the Spring Hill Farm subdivision that planning commission had already approved the preliminary plat. This is specifically for Section one. What I have up on the screen now visualizes how they're dividing the different sections. As I said, section one is up here in the top corner here and then I'll pull up the specific subdivision plat here.

Mr. Bowsher: It should be no, there is no change from the preliminary plat that was before you guys to the final plan. No, no changes.

Mr. Zollars: OK, so there's really nothing to discuss?

Mr. Hicks: I just had Mr. Chairman. Just one quick comment. I think when this came before us for major sight plan, my biggest concern was traffic. I think that after talking about it and the unfortunate circumstances of how this project ties into Waggoner Road and sort of the limited available options of being able to get that curb cut and the Waggoner road, my biggest concern was that we were creating another intersection there that didn't create a true four way intersection, which would be ideal, and Waggoner, which has all kinds of traffic problems. So I think it's unfortunate that there wasn't a way, I think with a condition that we put forth in the meeting was that the location of the curb cut had to be approved by the city's engineer in regards to traffic and picking the safest location. After talking with staff, it appears the city has achieved that. I know it's not an ideal situation, but we are dealing here with an infill property with a lot of decisions that have been made in the past on where curb cuts and other communities have tied in and where they step out. I think there's a lot of positives to this development. And even in regards to traffic. This community ties into three or four other locations and other communities that will help hopefully relieve some traffic congestion at some of the other intersections along Waggoner Road and provide better connectivity for some of those neighbors that have always been sort of waiting for the next phase of development where those road connections will come in. So I just I hope everybody here on Planning Commission is cognizant that proper planning and new communities is really important, that these intersections and the public improvement aspect of it is what we really, really have to focus on. And unfortunately, Reynoldsburg, we just have a lot of areas that don't connect well. We've got a lot of dead end streets, things like that. Which we'd like to avoid but understanding all that, I mean, I don't see any reason why the staff and the applicant haven't achieved those conditions that we set in our last time we reviewed this proposal.

Mr. Zollars: Emily, staff, I should say, so we are currently unable to tie this into Rodebaugh, so it's going to be jagged, there's going to be a stop sign at Rodebaugh, a red light at Rodebaugh and then another entrance, what, a couple hundred yards away, correct? That's what we're approving?

Mr. Bowsher: Yes. That's what you approved when we did the Planning Commission. You're not really approving that. We've already approved that. And then the goal was to allow the city engineer to make sure that it was safe. All the approval is tonight is based off of an ORC code that states that you are agreeing that these plats meet what you have intended and you're accepting these plats into the city of Reynoldsburg, as stated here, and then this will go on to city council for a final plat. It's just something we have to do, but it really has nothing to do with the specifics of the development. It's more so you're talking about these parcels, these fifty six parcels right here. We'll have this probably come up six more times as they start to develop it through. And they may try to do and combine sections together on how fast this gets developed and build out. And with the second hottest real estate market in the country right now, we'll probably have another one here come maybe even two next year as well as we go through this development.

Mr. Zollars: So with that information, if there's no questions or no further comments, I'd entertain a motion.

Mr. Hicks: I'd like to move that we approve the plat application as submitted.

Mr. Furst: I'll Second.

Mr. Zollars: Can we get the roll call on it, please?

But as we were developing the comprehensive plan and the zoning code, there was always an intention that we were going to have to at some point once you started living with the new code to make adjustments in order to make everything work. I appreciate the hard work the staff has put into making these changes and the red lines. And I appreciate the way that it was presented to us. I had a few minor critiques and changes. One was some of the permitted uses within the community commercial area, which, from what I understand, those changes have been made. I had some comments in regards to commercial vehicle parking, parking on the street, recreational vehicle parking, and where those are permitted to be located on someone's lot and also some comments and questions in regards to design guidelines on window trims and things like that. So it's my understanding and reviewed language that those first three changes have been adopted. I don't think that we've been able to adopt my last request for some reasons, I think we just need some more time to be able to work through something like that. I think I just want to stress that as we've adopted the new code, we've made these changes and sort of calibrations to things to be able to fix some stuff that were just unforeseen

complications with it. I think it's a great step forward again for Reynoldsburg. And then as we make that next step, I think we always need to be thinking about how we're going to make this better. I think implementing some common sense, additional design guidelines for some of the development will be necessary at some point. I think we'll have to have more conversations about how we handle issues like that. There's there some issues that we've talked about and ask as we're developing this whole thing. An issue that was brought to my attention today, again, was, you know, there's communities like Huber that are primarily all single story that have some rebuild houses, houses that have burned down and be rebuilt, that we've been challenged in trying to figure out how to actually regulate, to make sure that they conform with the rest of the community. And how we handle situations like that, I think maybe isn't quite as addressed as we could be in the code at this point. So I think that's it for my comments. I think those bigger issues were addressed and the changes and red lines that were sent, which is good. But one thing I think that next step we need to be thinking about is maintaining a minimum level of quality for any new development, whether it's a redevelopment of an old parcel or a new community, to ensure that it is an adequate and good quality product in those locations going forward.

Mr. Zollars: Very good. OK, I agree. Thanks, Hicks. Anyone else from the commission or from staff want to add to or elaborate on any of the activities to this point?

Ms. Wheeler: Yeah, I mean, I was going to propose going through each section, just putting up the red line text and then just doing a quick overview of what was changed. If we want to do that.

Mr. Zollars: I don't really feel like going through one hundred pages, quite frankly, if we can keep it at a higher level.

Mr. Bowsher: Maybe let us go through the overall and if there's something that we want to talk about, we can dove into that Id that fair? I think it's important to something overall and then let us read through real quick.

Mr. Zollars: OK.

Mr. Bowsher: So kind of starting from the top, obviously, we had some Brice and East Maine district and also the east main street also, basically our insight districts, the majority of this was removing the maximum side yard and the maximum rear, amending maximum density, and then obviously adding and changing some of the uses. We made some of those changes to correspond with; to better suit the uses that we expect to be there and the ones that we are happy with. Then also, I think it was interesting because clearly this zoning is the Brice and Main is the Kmart center. And clearly, we had a Walgreens, the one that came in there, needed to get some variances. I think those variances were already there, but I think we needed to limit some of them. And so that was a good test case as we were sort of moving

through that. So that's kind of what we have pretty cut and dry on that one. Suburban residential obviously changing some of the permitted and conditional uses, mainly the school, amending the accessory building location and then removing garage design standards, the specific one. And I think a lot of this kind of came up when we discussed it at BZBA last time about the one covered and one uncovered parking spaces to change to just two off street parking spaces. Granted, we see this the majority of the time and the Huber neighborhoods. Additionally, talking about where that garage location would be. We did have it needed to be six feet behind the front building facade. That didn't seem realistic. So we had to change that. Then we move that to the garage requirements later on in the common regulations where it stands at. Moving on, residential medium, we amended the maximum building height that was the main change for this one, and then the community commercial obviously not put here is the changes that Steven had requested. But the majority of these were the permitted and conditional uses and making sure they're in line with what we expect to have in this community commercial zone. We see this as a current CC district, very suburban, but also moving into more of a mixed use district and allowing a various office park food service, big box retail, small medical and overnight lodging hotel, and motel. Moving on, we went to the innovation, we made some changes to this. This is obviously down on the Brice area as well as L brands and the Ohio Agricultural Department out on Main Street. This was just better aligning the uses and what we desire to have in those areas, adding in some ones that got missed, like medical office, things of that nature, and then bringing some of the conditional uses that we do want permitted. We don't want to make people have to jump through uses for things such as like a visual art center or something like that. So just changing some of those and then changing some of the permitted uses for ones that maybe are less desirable, like the vehicular sales, a shooting range and things of that nature to more of a conditional. So we have a little bit more teeth as we're starting to review applications. We don't want to allow just a slew of bad uses in the city without us having an extra layer of protection. Signs, there was a lot of redundancies, these changes were to better align what we're seeing out there, we were putting on secondary uses which weren't in line with what we actually wanted. And so we got rid of those and we went into a little bit more detail. We can allow Emily to do this, but this was sort of her brainchild. She deals with this every single day. So this was better aligning to what was the intended purpose of the sign portion of the code. Obviously, the accessory structures, we talked about the garage design standards, so those changes and then they got added into this section. Landscaping a buffering the submittal of the landscaping plant and a tree survey and then zoning certificate now required for additional pervious surface, just better aligning to what we're seeing. Supplementary use conditions, traffic study for drive thru establishments at the discretion of Planning Commission or BZBA, and then zoning permit not required for a roof mounted solar panels. Nonconformity's, discontinuation timeline to three months, so this basically means that if there is a use that is a non-conforming use inside of the district instead of the two years that they did have, it will be changed to three months. So it can only sit vacant for tops of three months before a use could go in there or it reverts and they lose the non-conforming clause and they do have to then

conform for any future use there. It's a good protection, especially as we start to change some of these uses that does not meet the context of the comprehensive plan and where the city is moving forward. So it's really to get those uses phased out in a much more aggressive fashion.

Mr. Zollars: Andrew, could you please give us an example of what this might be?

Mr. Bowsher: Yeah, so I think where we're going to see this the majority of the time is in the innovation area along Brice Road. So as we're trying to bring different businesses there, we need to get rid of some of the smaller retail type establishments that no longer belong there and fit that needs of what that corridor and what we envision as the corridor. So instead of allowing a user to come in time and time again and continue to sign new leases and not getting really what we want, we're limiting the opportunity of vacancies inside that building to sit there and then a new user to come in and still be a non-conforming use. At this stage, it means it can only sit there vacant without that use being activated for three months before it gets reverted to the new portion of the code.

Mr. Zollars: Thank you.

Mr. Bowsher: Zoning certificate, this was something that city attorney Shook wanted added in there, utilizing our property maintenance code and violations and making sure that better aligns to how we function as the city and giving us a bit more teeth and making sure that it's not just Emily reviewing all that, but our code enforcement team that's reviewing zoning violations and property maintenance violations. Then the site plan and design review, we wanted to better align what we were taking a look at, when somebody submit something, we've actually changed it. It was just too close when we were talking about just a standard site plan and a major site plan. So we went back to the minor site plan and a major site plan. And then that minor site plan is basically anything that's less than five thousand square feet. Some of those and we've outlined to better align to what Emily and myself actually need to review and to check mark boxes before it gets put on the planning commission. And we're not asking for site civil type drawings just yet. So we need to do better, align with what we were asking for. So landscape concept plan, transportation and parking plan, current zoning of the parcels, location of buildings and structures, location of existing water, body streams, drainage ditches, the dimensions of the property line parcels and adjoining right away and then a standard site. So all these things we look for, it's always what we've had. We just don't want to overdo it. And then of course, once we get into the major site plan, we can ask for additional things if Emily finds it necessary, as well as planning commission. Then the major site plan. The biggest difference is minor site plan can be reviewed in house being less than five thousand square feet in size. Major site plan is anything over five thousand square feet, whether it's residential or commercial. Minor site plan is only commercial property. But what we don't want is somebody that wants to build a single family home that has to submit twenty thousand dollars in design when really we're just trying to review the architectural details of the home as well as the

site plan, so wanted to make sure that we weren't overstepping on something of that nature. Certificate of appropriateness, we had it on 30 days that didn't align to actually what we needed. So it's a 14 days prior to the Planning Commission meeting and the certificate of appropriateness, as everyone knows now, is mainly just in the old Reynoldsburg districts, the two districts there, both neighborhood and commercial.

Mr. Hicks: Do you guys have the updated language for the commercial vehicle and RV thing, might just be good to touch on that? Thank you.

Mr. Bowsher: Chris, since you wrote that, you want to touch on this one?

Mr. Shook: Yes, so at the request of Commissioner Hicks, we took a look at the commercial vehicle parking restrictions in residential districts. We went ahead and decided that we would permit dual axle trucks in that district that are less than fourteen thousand pounds as long as they are parked on the lot. So the way that I structured it was to change the language so that trucks having dual tires on one or more axles or having more than two axles will still be prohibited on residential streets, but will be permitted if they are parked in the driveway in a residential district as long as they are under 14 thousand pounds. In addition, we looked at the RV language, if you want to scroll down a little bit to that. We changed up the RV language to make it easier for residents to be able to have an RV on their lot in the City of Reynoldsburg. Quite frankly, it would have been impossible for the city to effectively enforce the code as it was constructed before. So what we've done is we do allow a residential vehicle to be parked in a residential district as long as it's in an enclosed structure and we allow at least one or a maximum of one recreational vehicle located outside an enclosed structure in a residential district as long as it's parked in the driveway, as long as it's three feet from the front right of way, and as long as it's three feet from an adjacent property. We have some other restrictions in there as well that were already included in there. But what we wanted to do was we wanted to make it easier for residents in the City of Reynoldsburg to be able to own and possess on their lot a recreational vehicle. It would have been impossible for us to enforce it the way that it was previously written.

Mr. Bowsher: Thanks, Chris. There was a question that came through just as related, not to this specific one, but Mrs. Sarah Reed brought up. The question was she said, Stephen Hicks, that's a great point, drove through Retton today and my husband and I noted the two story house cited in the midst of the one to one and a half story brick homes that did stick out a bit. How would the new zoning code help us in the future? In fact, that was one thing that was correct when it was in there. Unfortunately, the old zoning code a long time ago for that whole area allowed for two and a half story buildings. Yes. Not in line with what that area is. And that's how they have that basement and makes it look like its two and a half stories. So we limited the building height. That's something that we're not changing and we're keeping it in there. So it's only a maximum of two stories, not necessarily next to that house, but in the Huber neighborhood as you get closer to Main Street, there are

two story homes in the Huber area and that is where it conforms to. So we have a height standard. So that home, if they were to come back and try to rebuild that as of today, it couldn't happen again.

Mr. Hicks: If they ever finish it?

Mr. Bowsher: Correct.

Mr. Furst: Mr. Chairman, if you will, I am kind of sympathetic to Mr. Hicks comments regarding the minimum quality standards. I know with modern building construction, one of the nightmare type scenarios that we're ideally looking to avoid when we've talked about things like minimum trim requirements and things like that, is that wall of vinyl sort of look where if there's very minimal trim and just something to cover the cuts in the vinyl or virtually no trim at all? I personally think that's a very unattractive look and that's not doing anything to sell the property. I think you're increasing the risk for maintenance issues further on down the line. And, you know, certainly we don't want to set ourselves up for a scenario where you might put in a product today and 10, 20, 30 years from now, if it falls into disrepair, I think if you have a much more esthetically pleasing product, something that seems more complete, not just that's had some corners cut for the sake of keeping it to a bare minimum price point, then you avoid some of that scenario. So I know that someone has brought up that Mr. Benner wanted to have a discussion about the architectural design standards. I think Mr. Hicks concern kind of corner stone's nicely with that discussion. I'd like to talk about that now if we could.

Mr. Zollars: Yeah, go ahead.

Mr. Benner: Yes. Mr. Hicks and I were able to talk a little bit this afternoon. I'm assuming everyone received his email with the changes that he wanted to have included in this amendment. And I'm sure you all have your various opinions. I guess what Mr. Hicks and I were able to agree to today is that design standards are probably going forward, a very important part of what we're doing here as planning commission, especially with the increase in development that's happening here in Reynoldsburg. I'm not sure it's such that we can discuss it this evening and that it makes this particular change. You know, in the weeks that we've been meeting to make these amendments, the one thing that's come up constantly is that this is a huge living document that is going to require that it be looked after and possibly changed over time. We could be back in six months. We could be back in a year. I think architectural standards like we're discussing will require more time than we have this evening to come up with. A three inch trim, I drove the city today just to look at some of what's out there. And, you know, you have you have brick structure with absolutely no trim around any window. You have stone and stucco, sometimes without trims around the windows. On the other hand, all vinyl with just J channel running right up to the edge of the windows in the hole there certainly is unattractive. I think my reply in the email to Mr. Hicks was that that's absolutely the most unattractive two story home with no trim whatsoever. Just a wall of vinyl is not

something that we probably want. But just saying three inch trim on all windows and doors, I think is a little arbitrary, not something that we could really do quickly. I think it does merit more discussion, more thought, maybe another committee. I don't know. I just don't think that we can make that this evening.

Mr. Bowsher: I think that makes a lot of sense. It's something interesting. I was talking to an ex council member today and kind of brought this up. And I talked with Emily about it as well. You know this document. Yes, we have to have it. A living document. There's a lot to it and things like that. I think that we've done some great work and kudos to the individuals that helped us. It wasn't just staff, but there was members of council. There was two planning commissioners that are here tonight, both Alex and Keith, and input from everyone, the mayor included. And obviously Attorney Shook. I want to note that the next phase of this is updating our development handbook, and I think that's where I'm trying to get to, is maybe the architectural designs as we get into real tough specifics, probably need to change to called the developers handbook because it's more of a document that's based in details; architecture, engineering. Talks about specific ready mixes for streetscape, things of that nature. You know, potentially maybe that's something where that could live in that we then give to a developer after it's done and saying if it we're going to say across the board, we're looking for these things. Maybe it's something that we can get back together on as we start to update that, because we do mention that here in the zoning code that that's the next phase as it gets in the site civil drawing that those are things that they need to have included. It's just something to discuss. But it's a thought.

Mr. Zollars: Very good, good discussion. I have a question on particularly on the, I can't zoom down. Whatever section we're currently looking on the parking on the streets and the part with two vehicles, what is the enforcement procedure and what are those timelines? Is that in here somewhere?

Mr. Shook: So the enforcement mechanism is going to be in Section 1109 and we did change significantly the enforcement section to provide a little bit more detail about what that process would be and who would have the power to enforce the code. Previously, it was just the planning and zoning administrators so it put all of that responsibility on Emily. So we rephrase that so it would be the planning and zoning administrator or the designee in this case. And in these kinds of cases, that designee would be one of our code officials. What they do is that they observe a violation out on the street. And we've had several of these kinds of violations this year. They issue a notice of violation to the property owner with a recommended corrective action to take and a time line for the owner to take that corrective action. If they don't take that corrective action within that timeline, then we cite them in the mayor's court. Unfortunately, our previous code wasn't all that specific about what penalties we could necessarily enforce. It was before the changes that we put in here today. All we had was a maximum fine of two hundred fifty dollars for any zoning code violation. So we wanted to put a little bit more teeth into that. Now with the changes that are being proposed to the commission tonight, it would give us the

ability to be able to impose daily fines, fines of up to a thousand dollars, the ability of the city to seek penalties of civil forfeiture for zoning code violations. Not that we would necessarily ever intend to go that deep with it, but the intent of those penalty provisions is to be coercive, to motivate people to comply with the code. So we have we have some significant enforcement mechanisms in place with these changes.

Mr. Zollars: Thanks for sharing that. What else you have, Mr. Bowsher?

Mr. Bowsher: I believe that was it for the changes. Emily, was there anything on another page that I missed? As you were scrolling through, I can't remember where we left off. I apologize.

Ms. Wheeler: Nope, that was the end of the summary documents.

Mr. Bowsher: OK, thank you.

Mr. Hicks: On the technical question would be the action of this party tonight would be to recommend approval to council of the updated zoning changes. Is that correct?

Mr. Shook: That is correct. So if we have changes that need to be reflected here on the record that are different than what's been presented to the commission in the packet, we'll need a motion to amend so that those changes can be reflected. So that would include the changes in the community commercial district that take multi-family housing and make that a conditional use of the changes in the parking restrictions for commercial vehicles and for recreational vehicles. Then there's one other change that I noted that we had discussed that wasn't included in the package. I would ask for a motion to amend to reflect this changes that adult oriented businesses. We're going to be removed as a use in the innovation district and placed as a use in the community commercial district. Just to go into some detail in the minutes about that, as several members of this commission may be aware on the Columbus side of Brice Road, we have had adult oriented businesses that have created several problems in that corridor, including drug trafficking, prostitution, violent crime. The City of Columbus has had to shut down two of those facilities in that area. The one thing we don't want is for those kinds of businesses to be a permitted use on our side of that street to make that problem even worse.

Mr. Zollars: Very good. Perfect. So did any of you commissioners get those amendments? I would care to put that into a motion.

Mr. Hicks: All right, I'll try. Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a motion to amend the proposed changes to the zoning code and include the following amendments. First, I'd like to include the amendment of the community commercial code, removing the multifamily uses from permitted to conditional. Secondly, I would like to amend the code in regards to On-street parking and parking for commercial vehicles with the proposed language. Thirdly, I would like to amend the recreational vehicle parking

and storage requirements in the code. And fourth, I would like to amend the removal of adult oriented businesses from the innovation zone to the community commercial zone as a use.

Mr. Zollars: Does that cover everything, Mr. Shook?

Mr. Shook: Thank you.

Mr. Zollars: Very good. Thank you, Mr. Hicks. There's a first. How about a second?

Mr. Benner: Second.

Mr. Zollars: Thank you very much. OK, we get roll call on those?

Mr. Hicks: And we're voting on just those amendments and then we'll vote on the entire code, correct?

Unknown: Yes.

Mr. Zollars: All right, Emily, we have a first and second, so if you could call the vote on those amendments, please.

Ms. Wheeler: Yes. Mr. Benner. Yes. Mr. Cullinan. Yes. Mr. Furst. Yes. Mr. Hicks. Yes. Mr. Zollars. Yes.

Mr. Zollars: Very good. Thank you very much on that and for staff and Chris and everybody explaining and detailing that out for us.

Mr. Furst: Mr. Chairman. If you don't mind, I move that we recommend the changes for approval by City Council.

Mr. Benner: Second.

Mr. Zollars: Can we get the roll call on that, please?

Mr. Benner. Yes. Mr. Cullinan. Yes. Mr. Furst. Yes. Mr. Hicks. Yes. Mr. Zollars. Yes.
