COMMUNITY COMMENTS

**Ronald Kinietz
7150 E Main Street**

Mr. Kinietz stated that he is a retired deputy sheriff from Franklin County who used to work in Canal Winchester and the reason he brought this up was when they built low income housing in Canal off of Gender road, the crime rate went through the roof. He noticed that here in Reynoldsburg there are stolen cars, break-ins, and cars rummaged

through and these are all people he believes are on drugs and need money. He stated that this will be the same thing that happens at the new low income housing. He is also concerned about taking Main Street down to one lane and the bus having its own lane; this will cause Main Street to become even more congested.

David Campbell
7150 E Main Street

Mr. Campbell stated that he is concerned about some of the developments in Reynoldsburg. He asked if it was normal for cities to take on projects without having any funding. He also asked how the taxpayers money be recouped after the half million dollar loss on the low income housing project. He stated that they are all concerned about crime and wondered how the City plans to handle these situations as we continue to grow.

Denise Parker
7150 East Main Street

Ms. Parker stated she is concerned about where low-income housing would be built. Main Street is already congested, and they already have a hard time getting onto Main from where they live. She is also concerned about their property values going down. They have invested a lot of money into beautifying the community and want to protect what they have. She explained that several homes near her had been broken into, so being near the police station does not stop bad things from happening, so she was not sure if they were prepared for more crime. She also stated that if we have to have low income housing, why does it have to be in the middle of downtown? They are hoping for walkable areas that people can enjoy and adding this low-income housing there. How can they be sure that the low income housing won't be full of the very, very low income, below 30%? She is also concerned about schools being overloaded and having enough bus drivers. She also stated that if we want to help people, why aren't we helping seniors and veterans in the community?

Juanita Pennington
7150 East Main Street

Ms. Pennington requested that Council deny the housing project and agrees with what Ms. Parker had something to say about the project as well. She explained that her main concern is where all these children will go to school, since schools are already very crowded.

Kyle Hawthorne
589 Gilmore Drive

Mr. Hawthorne stated that he is a homeowner, and he is concerned about low-income housing. He stated that he worked hard to get where he is today, purchasing a house at 24 years old. He stated that he is trying to protect his investments, and it is sad that the property value will go down if low-income housing is built. He explained that he understands that people need help, but he picked Reynoldsburg instead of Whitehall for a reason. He stated that there isn't much more he can say that wasn't already said by someone else.

Dan Cowgill
7150 East Main Street

Mr. Cowgill stated that last August, he was awoken by a masked intruder in his home. He explained that he was able to scare him off and RPD had the intruder within 10 minutes. He explained that he is worried about elderly people in his neighborhood dealing with the same issue and is concerned about if the new low-income housing will bring crime to the area.

Jodi Hittle
274 Robin Ln

Ms. Hittle stated that there is an emergency crisis happening in the low income housing Reynoldsburg already has. That housing is about to be stripped away from 290 households which are elderly, disabled, veterans, and low-income families. They live there independently, not asking for help from anyone. Someone has allowed a private business to come in and buy out the property while acting hostile, combative, and assaulting the people that live there while operating in bad faith and intending to do harm. She explained that it feels as though the government and lawmakers do not care about this situation. She stated that when they try to defend themselves, they are told that they will be thrown out of the neighborhood, and they will have no support. She wanted to bring attention to this issue while they are focusing on new low income housing rather than trying to protect the housing they already have.

Shirley Shires
599 Gilmore Drive

Ms. Shires stated that she was not sure that she could do any better than the woman who just spoke before her. She stated that she can't think of anything positive that would come from building low-income housing right in downtown Reynoldsburg. She stated that we don't have enough police or school bus drivers, as it is. She stated that she is also concerned about the creek bank flooding in that area. She believes that this is moving the town in the wrong direction as no one will want to live or move here.

Lauren Nader

7627 Palmer Road

Ms. Nader stated that Council is the grimmest looking group of people she has ever seen and that they should smile more. She believes that a four-story building on the proposed low income housing lot does not fit the area. She explained that she has lived here all her life and that Reynoldsburg is a suburb of Columbus, not Columbus itself. She stated that they could set their sights a little higher and aim for a two or three-story building with a restaurant and patio on the first floor and full-price apartments on the other floors. She stated that there are already properties in Reynoldsburg that take vouchers, and she would love to know what percentage of that there is because she believes that it is a lot. She stated that seeing in the paper that "Intel is coming, and we have to provide housing," and stated that they don't have to provide housing. She would also like to see patio homes considered for this area. She stated that she would like to stay in her home and see Reynoldsburg grow responsibly.

Email Comment

Melvin Sedlock

I drive to the post office in Pickerington to avoid the congestion at the Reynoldsburg Post Office. Building 100 apartments at this intersection is totally irresponsible.

Councilmember Johnson

Councilmember Johnson stated that she would like to take this time to thank you for allowing her the opportunity to serve on the 5th Annual Juneteenth Celebration committee. She stated that it was an amazing event and enjoyed working with Council President Lawson-Rowe and Jennifer Clemens and her staff. She thanked all the sponsors, vendors, and special guests. She also thanked the Reynoldsburg community for showing up and making this event a success.

Councilmember Hill

Councilmember Hill stated that she met with the new director of the YMCA last week to discuss some different issues, and they had a great meeting and dialogue. She stated that she was met with openness and genuine curiosity and appreciated that they were able to create an open dialogue for some accountability and transparency for the community.

Mayor Begeny

Mayor Begeny introduced Judy Doran from the Senior Center to receive this proclamation.



Office of the Mayor Proclamation

WHEREAS, in the United States, the population of people aged 65 and over is expected to grow from 35 million in 2000 to 88.5 million by 2050, taking the total share of the 65+ population from 12 percent to 20 percent of the total population; and

WHEREAS, 21.5 percent of the population of Reynoldsburg is aged 60 and over, 16 percent is aged 65 and over and the number of older Reynoldsburg residents is projected to continue to increase; and

Whereas, a significant portion of Reynoldsburg's population is aging and the residents of Reynoldsburg recognize that an aging population impacts all, as individuals and as a civil society; and

Whereas, as Reynoldsburg residents stay healthier and active longer, the city, and its neighborhoods should adapt to the needs of changing demographics to serve the interests of its residents and sustain economic and social vitality; and

Whereas, the World Health Organization (WHO) and AARP have developed a global network of Age-Friendly states, counties, cities, and communities to encourage and promote public policies to increase the number of communities that support healthy aging and thereby improve the health, well-being, satisfaction, and quality of life for older adults; and

Whereas, active aging is a life-long process, whereby an age-friendly community is not just "elder-friendly" but also intended to be friendly to all ages; and

Whereas, the WHO and AARP have noted that "making communities age-friendly is one of the most effective policy approaches for responding to demographic aging," and

Whereas, the WHO and AARP have developed eight domains of community life that influence the livability and quality of life of persons of all ages: respect and social inclusion, outdoor spaces and buildings, communication and information, social participation, work and civic engagement, community and health services, housing, and transportation; and

Whereas, the WHO and AARP recognized communities have different needs, resources, and varying capacities to engage their resources to take action to facilitate activity again; and

Whereas, the City of Reynoldsburg's Senior Center, managed by the Senior Citizens of



Reynoldsburg (SCOR), established in 1971, supports age-friendly policies and community resources to secure the City's future; and

Whereas, the City of Reynoldsburg will engage in the WHO and AARP's Network of Age-Friendly Communities Program intended to foster innovation and improve the quality of life for the families and residents of all ages in our City;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Joe Begeny, Mayor of the City of Reynoldsburg, do hereby proclaim Reynoldsburg as a city committed to promoting, creating, and sustaining a community for all ages.

Judy Doran stated that on April 12, 2024, Reynoldsburg was accepted into the Age Friendly Community network, and they are the 31st community in Ohio to be accepted. She stated that this is an international movement and the World Health Organization wants to get ahead of this changing environment.

Councilmember Strickland asked what some of the criteria were for getting accepted into this network. Ms. Doran stated that it is an application process that includes us stating that we want to make our community involved more. It is a 5-year process, the first year you apply and get accepted and is the assessment period. They assess what the City can do to become more age-friendly. There will be a kickoff on July 24 for this assessment so that people are welcome to come to and express their wants for the community.

Mayor Begeny stated that June is a busy month for Reynoldsburg. They had the Pride event, Juneteenth, Markets off Main, Concerts on the Lawn, and these events all went very well, and he thanked the parks and rec and events department for their work.

Mayor Begeny stated that he would also address some of the things brought up in the community comments. He stated that the BRT is not a Reynoldsburg initiative but will actually go to the voters this year. They are working with them because if it does pass, they will need to work with them throughout the process. He also explained that the City owns a number of properties. Besides the PNC site, they also sold another property across from the cemetery that almost completely makes up for the money lost on the PNC site sale. He explained the reason that they hope to get medical offices on the first floor of the proposed apartment building would be because that office would pay the bills. He stated that it is still a possibility that something else will end up in that office space, but things like restaurants are hit or miss, so they are more skeptical. He further explained that all the other things mentioned in the comments were considered, and he does hear what they are saying about this issue.

Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law

The final paragraph indicates, based upon Council's findings of fact and conclusions of law, that it is granted in its entirety with the condition that the sign be illuminated only when the business is in operation and that the variance condition #3 is strictly conditioned upon it continuing to operate as a barber shop.

Liquor Hearing Results - Quick Stop 5978

Attorney Shook stated that this was an application for a new permit at 5978 E



Livingston Ave. Based upon the investigation done by RPD, it was recommended that we request a hearing. That hearing took place on April 3, 2024, where we presented the testimony of Chief Curtis Baker in opposition to the permit application and there is a copy of the order in the packet. The order to deny includes the reasoning put forth by the City.

The new stats from the West Licking Fire district for the month of May were included in the packet.

Development, Parks & Recreation Committee

This is the Development, Parks & Recreation Committee meeting for June 24, 2024.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Cotner, Councilmember Hill, Councilmember Johnson, Chair Salvati and President Lawson-Rowe

An Ordinance to Authorize the Mayor to Enter into a Purchase Option Agreement with Metropolitan Housing Partners, Inc. for the Purpose of Future Sale and Re-Development of Real Estate, and Declaring an Emergency

Director Meyer stated that CMHA is going after a variety of funding sources and one of those sources is the Ohio Low Income Housing Tax Credit. They were notified that the application process will probably be in August, so they need control over the lot by the time this application goes through, which is why they are requesting emergency language be added. They requested a three-read emergency.

Councilmember Cotner asked how this meets the requirements for needing emergency approval. Attorney Shook stated that there is a lot of lenience when it comes to what constitutes an emergency, so he will leave that up to Council to decide.

Councilmember Salvati moved to amend this Ordinance to include emergency language. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

Councilmember Strickland asked if they have had conversations with the school board about an increase in the population and how they will deal with that and if they have considered how this may affect the crime rate. Mayor Begeny stated that they meet with the President of the Board of Education at least once a month to discuss whatever issues they may be facing at that time. He has also talked to the superintendent about this project and any other housing project that may come to

Reynoldsburg. He explained that there are issues with overcrowding but some of that has come from the closing of a middle school. He has also discussed this housing project with Chief Baker and, while the police station is close by, that does not necessarily guarantee safety. He stated that just because people are poor does not mean they are going to commit crimes. Crime is prevalent in general in society right now, so they are continuously looking for ways to increase safety. They have added more staff and social workers to try to combat some of these issues. CMHA also does a great job of holding residents accountable for their actions while living there.

Councilmember Hill stated that they have discussed issues with the flood plain and would like to know what information they have found about what could possibly be built there with little environmental impact. Mayor Begeny stated that they have looked at and redid the flood plain map to include the YMCA, so that it is a relatively new and accurate map. There are things they will do on the engineering side to mitigate some of those potential issues. Once they start getting further into the project, if they find that they cannot complete the project as planned without harming the area, then they must redesign the size or scope of the project to fit the land or abandon the project all together. Councilmember Hill also brought up the idea that they may have the option to have shared parking with the YMCA, but she explained that she is at the YMCA every day, and it is full every time she goes. Director Meyer stated that they have an MOU with them that gives them the ability to do shared parking, not a guarantee of parking. This will be addressed further once it goes to the planning and zoning board if it is passed.

Councilmember Strickland asked how much low income housing we currently have in Reynoldsburg. Mayor Begeny stated that there are 33 units of voucher based housing currently. Other units may accept it, but there is only one location that is dedicated to voucher-based housing. This unit we are discussing today would have 25 dedicated units. Councilmember Strickland asked if there was any data regarding the 33 voucher-based homes and their crime rate in Reynoldsburg. Mayor Begeny stated that they have only had 2 major incidents and those residents were evicted after those incidents. He explained that the waiting list for those locations are about three years, so there are many people waiting to get into housing and don't want to lose the opportunity they've been given.

Councilmember Salvati asked about the housing that was for incomes averaging around \$27-80k a year and if those units would also be application based. Director Meyer stated that they have to create a tenant selection program and there are different rules and requirements that they must include with things like background checks which are required to receive the type of funding they have requested. Councilmember Salvati stated that it is his opinion that a lot of times people are talking about affordable housing, that housing is actually garbage with terrible

landlords add they general treat the low income people that live there like garbage. And in turn, those people treat the property like garbage. He believes that if you offer affordable housing to people and treat them with respect, then they will treat the property with respect as well. He believes that CMHA will do a good job maintaining this property based on the other properties they own.

President Lawson-Rowe asked what the occupancy rate is of these apartments and how many units are available. Mayor Begeny stated we have around a mid 90% occupancy rate, so there is not a ton of open space. There are around 25 open apartments in Reynoldsburg as of June 18 but many of those have pending applications. There is not enough housing to cover the number of people that live here and that is why rent is continuing to go up. The average price of a 2-bedroom apartment is around 16-1700 a month and 3-bedroom apartments are going for over 2000 a month. He stated that there are some bills floating around the statehouse regarding seniors, veterans, or limited income individuals and their property tax.

Councilmember Cotner stated that he has no issue with those who use vouchers, and we may never know who around us uses a voucher. He stated that CMHA does a great job keeping up with their properties and accepting vouchers. He clarified that this project is concerning to him because of the number of units, the location of the project, the creek, the parking, and many other issues that have nothing to do with CMHA and low income housing.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this amended Ordinance to Council for a second reading. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

An Ordinance to Accept Multiple Deeds for the Waggoner Road Phase I Project, and Declaring an Emergency

Attorney Shook stated that they have had discussions in the past about right of ways and easements for Phase 1 of the Waggoner Road project. These are the easements and right of way to date, and they have not had to file any eminent domains for these locations. This is just to formalize everything they have currently obtained.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Advertise for Bids for the 2025 / 2026 Streetscape Contract

Director Bauman stated that this is a contract we do every 2 years, and they would like to have the contract out and back by the end of October so that it is included in



the budget. This is from the western city limit to Waggoner and Graham.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Seek Requests for Proposals for the Parks and Recreation Department Master Plan

Director Bauman stated that this is one of the requirements for becoming CAPRA certified, as we discussed in April. This will be beneficial in the long run to make sure we are doing things the correct way and aren't missing anything.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

Public Safety, Law & Courts Committee

This is the Public Safety, Law & Courts Committee meeting for June 24, 2024.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Cotner, Councilmember Hill, Vice Chair Johnson, and President Lawson-Rowe.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 331.42 Texting While Driving Prohibited in the Codified Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg

Attorney Shook stated that this is an amendment to this section of our traffic code with the purpose of granting our officers the maximum flexibility to conduct traffic stops when they have observed someone using a handheld device. This will allow them to cite them at a local level and deal with this issue at the Mayor's Court.

Councilmember Johnson moved to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

Public Service & Transportation Committee

This is the Public Service & Transportation Committee meeting for June 24, 2024.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Cotner, Councilmember Hill, Councilmember Johnson, Chair Strickland and President Lawson-Rowe.

An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance No. 07-2013 Concerning the Contribution Amounts to the Water and Sewer Capital Improvement Project (CIP) Funds for the City of Reynoldsburg, Ohio

Director Dorman stated that in every water bill that is sent out, for every 1000

gallons of water we consume, a certain percentage of it goes to these funds to repair and maintain water and sewer infrastructure. He stated that the water fund has gone down, so they are requesting to move some funds from the sewer account to the water account.

Councilmember Strickland moved to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Appropriating Funds from the Public Service Department (110) Fund to the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA) Fund (201) for a Blacklick Creek Watershed Study

Director Dorman stated that a few years ago they received funding for the Blacklick Creek Watershed study, and they have received a few invoices that need to be paid. The grant is a reimbursable grant so they will receive that money back once it is paid.

Councilmember Strickland moved to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Enter into an Agreement with EMH&T for Engineering Design Services for a Future Public Alley North of East Main Street

Director Dorman stated that this Ordinance is for the area between French Run and the businesses along Main Street. It currently looks like an alley but is not technically a public alley. The landowners are all in agreement that they would like the City to construct and maintain the public alley in that area once they show them a plan.

Councilmember Strickland moved to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

A Resolution to Certify Special Assessments for Sidewalk Repairs and Replacement Costs Incurred by the City of Reynoldsburg in 2023 for Franklin and Licking Counties

Director Dorman stated that this Resolution is for the normal filing we do with the county every two years for the special assessments of the sidewalks.

Councilmember Strickland moved to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

Finance & Administration Committee



This is the Finance & Administration Committee meeting for June 24, 2024.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Strickland, Vice Chair Salvati and President Lawson-Rowe.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Execute All Actions Necessary to Accept Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC) 2024 Energized Community Grant

Mayor Begeny stated that this Resolution would allow us to apply for a grant through NOPEC, which is our aggregation provider. They plan to use the grant to switch the City's and police departments' lights over to LEDs to see savings in the future.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Strickland. Motion carried.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Enter Into An Agreement with Century Link Communications for Increased Internet Speed

Director Boller stated that this new agreement would allow us to increase our internet speed to 10 times what it is now for only \$43 more a month.

Councilmember Salvati moved to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Strickland. Motion carried.
