March 10, 2025**

CALL TO ORDER

Council President Shanette Strickland called the meeting to order at 6:30 PM.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Regular Meeting Minutes of February 24, 2025

The regular meeting minutes of February 24, 2025 were approved as submitted.

COMMUNITY COMMENTS

**Tanya Dexter
7255 Sorrelwood Court**

Ms. Dexter thanked President Strickland for her comments at the meeting last week and for taking the time to understand the issue of chicken ownership. She also thanked Councilmember Baker for reaching out to her to discuss this issue. She explained that she is interested in hearing what Council discussed regarding this matter and what the City Attorney discussed as well. She explained that she is slightly concerned, because some of the things President Strickland stated at the previous meeting were issues that Ms. Dexter had addressed before. She stated that one thing that was brought up last week that she had not discussed was the bird flu. She stated that bird flu is not a new issue and there have been many outbreaks in the past. She stated that there have been minimal issues with humans related to bird flu. She also explained that this issue is mostly controlled in residential areas by limiting flock size. She also stated that any animal can transmit diseases, so this is not something unique to chickens. She also expressed her concern because Council stated that this matter would not be discussed further unless they received a greater amount of interest from the community. She stated that this is a disservice to those who are interested in owning chickens and that discussing issues residents bring to Council is their purpose.

Councilmember Johnson

Councilmember Johnson thanked the residents that came out and supported Harriet Tubman Day at City Hall. She gave special thanks to President Strickland for coming out and reading the Proclamation that was introduced to Council and Representative Meredith Lawson-Rowe for attending as well with a Proclamation.

Councilmember Pyakurel

Councilmember Pyakurel stated that he is in support of having an open discussion about residential chicken ownership in a work session at Council. He agreed that this should be discussed to see what can and can't be done.

Councilmember Baker agreed that there should be a work session to discuss chicken ownership.

Councilmember Baker

Councilmember Baker congratulated the Reynoldsburg Boys' Basketball team for making it to the state semifinals.

Councilmember Baker also asked how the City could find a way to support Reynoldsburg City Schools. He stated that he has been an advocate for getting rid of pay to play ever since he joined Council. He asked the City Auditor if there was anything the City could do to better support our schools, like sponsorships or City funding.

Auditor Cicak stated that he agreed that sports programs, music programs, and any other school programs are important, and he would be glad to look into this. He stated that for the City to fund anything. It had to be proven that it was for the public good and could benefit everyone. Councilmember Baker felt this was worth looking into, and he believed that it was for the public good. He stated that there was no dollar amount that was too much to help our children. He believed there was some way that the City could assist the schools with the issues the district was facing. He explained that he observed other school districts in other communities passing levies and investing in their schools, and believed we should do the same. He hoped to see the levy returned to the ballot, even though it failed this past election.

Councilmember Cotner asked if Attorney Shook had any thoughts about what Councilmember Baker and Auditor Cicak had just discussed. Attorney Shook stated that the first step was to deal with the public purpose analysis. In most cases, the public purpose was pretty straightforward, like public roads. He stated that this situation may be tested waters somewhere, and they would look into if anything had

been done like this before; however, this could be an untested issue. If this had been untested in the past, their best option was to contact the state auditor's office to discuss the issue, as the last thing the City wanted to do was to spend funds and find out later it was an improper expenditure and getting a finding of recovery as that can be very difficult. Councilmember Cotner stated that there were great thoughts and great ideas and agreed we should look further into this.

President Strickland

President Strickland thanked Ms. Dexter for coming to Council and voicing her opinion. She reiterated that Councilmember Pyakurel requested a work session on this issue, and she would work with the Mayor and City Attorney to prepare for a discussion.

Mayor Begeny

Mayor Begeny stated that on Thursday, March 13th, from 6 to 7pm, Reynoldsburg Community Church and Reynoldsburg Chamber of Commerce were hosting the Build Your Own Business and Job Fair event. They would have many different vendors there to discuss various aspects of owning your own business.

Mayor Begeny stated that everyone should have gotten an email regarding the application for the Minority, Female, and Veteran Grant being live on the website. The only difference in the application this session was the timeline and the day to accept applications - March 31st.

Mayor Begeny stated that they were also trying to host a meeting with resident Kurt Keljo and various other entities to discuss the Huber Park Blacklick Stream Project and address its impact in both the short and long-term effects. He stated that Ms. Dexter's discussion regarding the avian flu coincided with his discussion with the Central Ohio Mayors and Managers meeting on Friday, where the Franklin County Board of Public Health and Columbus Director of Health were voicing their concerns about this issue and provided their thoughts about the process going forward. The main concern was washing your hands after handling any birds.

Councilmember Baker stated that the 2024 West Licking Fire District Annual Report and the January fire stats report were both been included in the packet. The annual report was very detailed, and it showed an increase in services in our area due to the population growth.

January Fire Stats Report

Development, Parks & Recreation Committee

This is the Development, Parks & Recreation Committee meeting for March 10, 2025.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Cotner, Councilmember Towns, Councilmember Hill, Chair Salvati, and President Strickland.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Enter into a Contract with EMH&T for Design Engineering, Construction Administration Services, and Bid Services for the Redevelopment of the Conversion of the JFK Tennis Courts, Appropriating Funds Therefor, and Declaring an Emergency

Director Bauman explained that this contract would allow them to go ahead with the conversion of the tennis courts into new pickleball courts. This grant was for \$150,000 from ODNR and the plan would need to be sent to ODNR for approval before beginning. They would like to start this project in August and be completed by October.

Councilmember Salvati made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Enter into a Contract with Shared Mobility for Transportation Services, Appropriate Funds, Waive Competitive Bidding, and Declaring an Emergency

Director Bauman stated that at the last meeting, Council accepted the grant of \$144,000. This Ordinance allowed them to enter into a contract with Shared Mobility. Shared Mobility was currently providing services in Dublin and Hilliard. She was requesting competitive bidding be waived as Shared Mobility was a sole service provider for proprietary technology. They need to have 20% of the total

cost in the budget for this project, but \$10,000 was donated by Meijer to the Senior Center, so around \$18,000 would be needed from the City. Shared Mobility will create all the route mapping, so all the requests would go through them.

Councilmember Salvati made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Purchase a Cushman Truckster XD and Related Equipment for the Parks and Recreation Department and Waive Competitive Bidding

Director Bauman stated that this purchase from Baker Solution was budgeted in the 2025 budget. They were able to waive competitive bidding for this item as Baker Solution was a part of a collective purchasing agreement. This vehicle would assist the Parks and Recreation Department with streetscape maintenance and could fit on the sidewalk.

Councilmember Salvati made a motion to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Hill. Motion carried.

Public Safety, Law & Courts Committee

This is the Public Safety, Law & Courts Committee meeting for March 10, 2025.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Cotner, Councilmember Towns, Councilmember Hill, Chair Johnson, and President Strickland.

Chief Baker stated that they used these services from Franklin County typically when an individual was uncooperative. These services were not utilized very frequently, but there were times services were rendered once they were transported to the county jail. This agreement was for 4 years. It was \$55 to fingerprint and photograph a prisoner and \$55 if they needed to collect DNA.

Councilmember Johnson made a motion to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

A Resolution to Request to Upgrade and Purchase Three Police Department Dispatch Stations Through REM Communications, Inc. and Waive Competitive Bidding

Chief Baker stated that this Resolution would allow the PD to upgrade their software and hardware in the dispatch center and add a third dispatch system

instead of just having two. They typically try to keep two dispatchers working at all times and having a third station would allow them to keep working if one station goes down or if something critical happens in the City. They plan to make these changes as quickly as possible.

Councilmember Johnson made a motion to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

WHEREAS, the Parks and Recreation Department are moving forward with the redesign and construction of the JFK Park tennis courts into Pickleball courts; and

WHEREAS, the City must now engage the City Engineer EMH&T with the design work necessary to complete these projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG, OHIO:

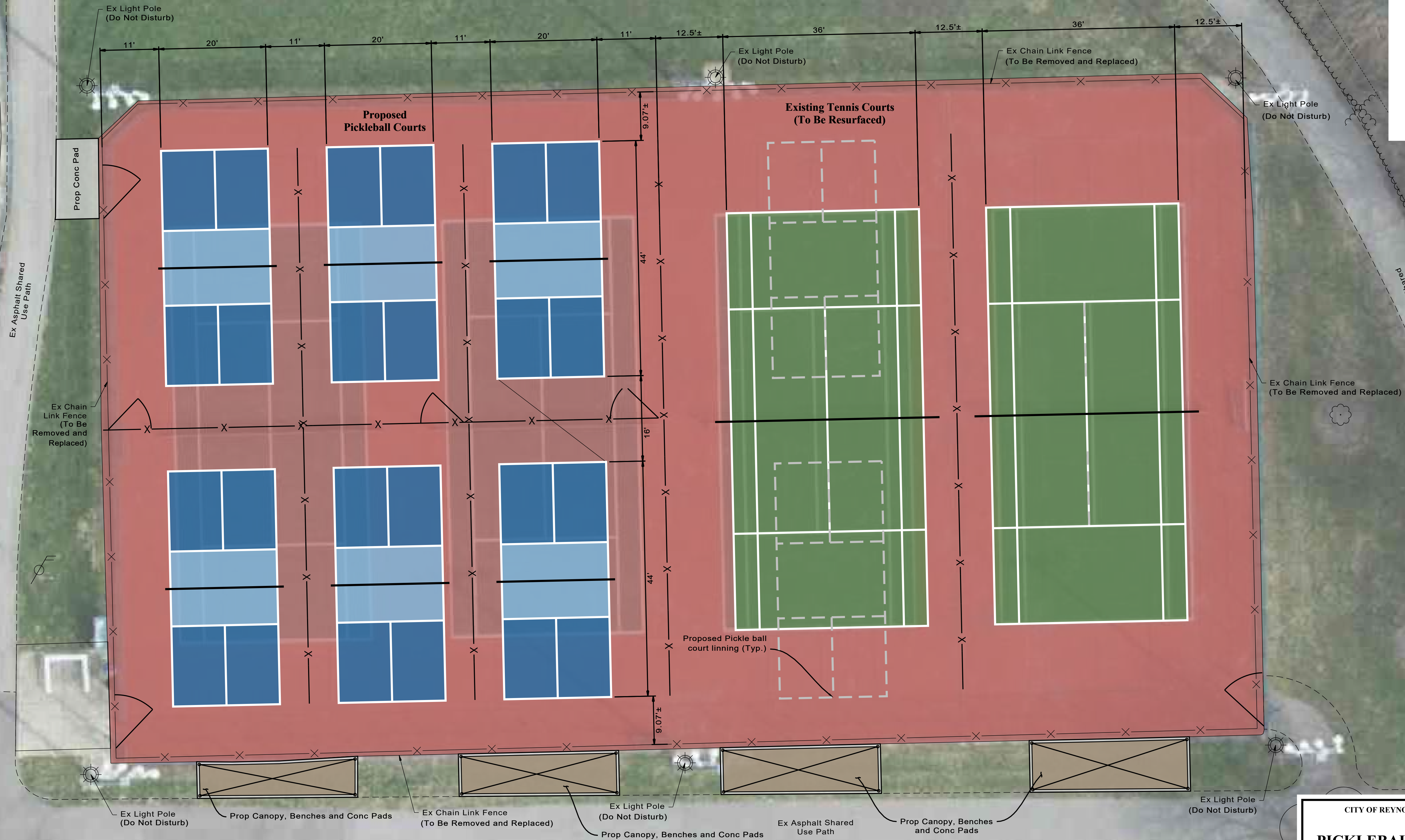
SECTION 1. That the Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into a contract with EMH&T for engineering design services for an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00.

SECTION 3. That this Ordinance is deemed to be an emergency measure necessary for the financial needs of the City's government and to allow for a 2025 completion of the project. Therefore, upon adoption by Council, this Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon signature by the Mayor.

**AN ORDINANCE CREATING A DESIGNATED OUTDOOR REFRESHMENT AREA
(DORA) AND ESTABLISHING SAFETY AND SANITATION PLANS**

WHEREAS, Section 4301.82 (B)(1)(b) of the Ohio Revised Code permits a municipality with a population of less than fifty thousand to create a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area within its corporate limits; and

WHEREAS, on _____, the Mayor of the City of Reynoldsburg filed an application with City Council for approval of a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area in a specified area of the City (the "Application"), as described in the application; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 4301.82(C) of the Ohio Revised Code, notice of the filing of the application for a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Reynoldsburg once a week for two separate weeks; and

WHEREAS, this Council conducted a public hearing on _____ to consider the Application; and

WHEREAS, this Council finds the Application is in compliance with Section 4301.82(B) of

the Ohio Revised Code and that the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area to be created would be in compliance with Section 4301.82(D) of the Ohio Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, this Council finds the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area will serve to enhance the experiences of patrons of City business establishments and the attendees of special events held within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG:

Section 1. The Application for the designation of certain property in the City as a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area is hereby approved, and there is hereby created the Reynoldsburg DORA Downtown Outdoor Refreshment Area ("Reynoldsburg DORA").

Section 2. Council finds there is compliance with the public notice requirements of Section 4301.82 of the Ohio Revised Code prior to the passage of this Ordinance.

Section 3. In order to ensure public health and safety within the Reynoldsburg DORA, City Council establishes the following requirements:

A. The specific boundaries of the Reynoldsburg DORA, including street addresses, are shown on the attached Exhibit A and B.

B. There will be signs designating the boundary of the Reynoldsburg DORA, as set forth in the attached Exhibit C.

C. The hours of operation for the Reynoldsburg DORA will be _____ through _____, from _____ m. to _____ m. and on _____ from _____ m. to _____ m. Special hours for the Reynoldsburg DORA will be allowed as designated in advance by the Mayor for holidays and/or special events, _____ with the consent of Council.

D. The Safety Plan has been established to ensure public safety in the Reynoldsburg DORA, which will be implemented by the Reynoldsburg Police Department and the Truro Township Fire Department, consistent with the attached Exhibit D. The Safety Plan can be implemented with existing staff.

E. The Sanitation Plan has been established to maintain the appearance and public health of the Reynoldsburg DORA, to be implemented through collaboration by the Reynoldsburg Departments of Public Service and Parks and Recreation, as set forth in the attached Exhibit E. The Sanitation Plan can be executed with existing staff.

F. For the purposes of the Reynoldsburg DORA, beer and intoxicating liquor shall be served solely in plastic bottles or other plastic containers that are distinctly marked.

Section 4. Five years from the effective date of the Ordinance, and every five years thereafter, Council shall review the operation of the Reynoldsburg DORA herein established and shall either approve its continued operation or dissolve it.

Section 5. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

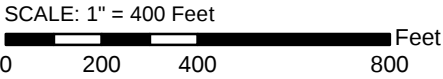

EXHIBIT D

Safety Plan for the Reynoldsburg DORA

In accordance with ORC 4301.82(B)(5), the proposed requirements for the purpose of ensuring public safety within the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA) are as follows:

Law Enforcement Responsibilities

The Reynoldsburg Police Department (RPD) will be responsible for providing law enforcement services within the DORA. The RPD main building is located less than one (1) mile from all boundaries of the DORA.

The on-duty supervisor shall ensure that appropriate attention is provided to the DORA during the hours of operation. In the event a larger than normal number of people are in the DORA, the on-duty supervisor may assign additional officers and/or assign an officer to specifically patrol the DORA. RPD may utilize various forms of patrol, such as RPD cruisers, motor unit, bicycle patrol, and/or foot patrol as methods of patrolling in the DORA.

For planned events in the DORA that may draw larger than normal attendance, the Chief of Police may have additional officers and/or other agency personnel assigned specifically to the DORA.

Fire/EMS Responsibilities

The Truro Township Fire Department will be responsible for providing Fire, Rescue, and EMS within the DORA. Station 161, 6900 E. Main Street, is located within one (1) mile of the closest boundary of the DORA and within two (2) miles of all boundaries of the DORA. Estimated response time would be between two (2) to four (4) minutes to any area within the DORA.

For planned events in the DORA that may draw larger than normal attendance, the Fire Chief may stage personnel and/or equipment in a location within or near the DORA to allow for an immediate response.

EXHIBIT E

Sanitation Plan

Trash Receptacles:

Each qualified liquor permit holder will be required to provide and maintain a trash receptacle and a recycling receptacle at all entrance/exit points at their individual establishments. The permit holders shall each be responsible for collecting litter near or around each of their occupied premises. The permit holders shall each be responsible for ensuring that recycling receptacles are not contaminated with non-recyclable waste, and that non-recyclable waste be brought to a centralized collection point, provided by the City of Reynoldsburg. At a bare minimum, the recycling receptacle shall feature signage indicating that DORA cups shall be disposed of in recycling receptacles.

Trash and recycling receptacles will be distributed and serviced throughout the DORA area by the City of Reynoldsburg. The City will regularly empty the receptacles, dispose of trash, and install heavy duty trash bags into the trash receptacles on a weekly basis, or as needed based upon activities and events occurring in the area.

Upon approval of the Service Director for the City, additional receptacles may be added by the City or any qualified permit holder, and the servicing of such receptacles shall remain the responsibility of the installing entity.

Street Sweeping:

The Service Director shall evaluate the need for, and frequency of, street sweeping and servicing of trash receptacles, and, if needed or advisable, shall implement changes or modifications to the Sanitation Plan from the commencement of the DORA until its dissolution.

The Director of the Service Department has determined that the Sanitation Plan described herein is sufficient to help maintain the appearance and public health within the DORA. This Sanitation Plan can be executed with the existing personnel of the City of Reynoldsburg.

REYNOLDSBURG DORA TIMELINE**STEP ONE → THE MAYOR'S APPLICATION [ORC § 4301.82(B)]**

- Submitted to City Council on April 14, 2025
- Contains all of the following:
 - Map or Survey in sufficient detail to identify the boundaries of the area, which shall not exceed 320 contiguous acres if the municipal corporation has a population of fifty thousand or less
 - General statement of the nature and types of establishments that will be located within the proposed outdoor refreshment area
 - Statement that the City shall not create more than three DORAs and that this DORA includes at least two (2) qualified permit holders
 - Evidence that the uses of land within the proposed outdoor refreshment area are in accord with the master zoning plan or map of the municipal corporation or township
 - Proposed requirements for the purpose of ensuring public health and safety within the proposed outdoor refreshment area

STEP TWO → NOTICE [ORC § 4301.82(C)]

- Within forty-five (45) days after the application is filed, City Council shall publish notice of the application twice in one newspaper of general circulation in the City
- The notice shall state that the application is on file in the office of the Clerk of Council and available for inspection during normal working hours
- The notice shall indicate the date and time for a public hearing to be held regarding the application

PROPOSED HEARING DATE: May 12, 2025 at 6:30 P.M.

STEP THREE → APPROVAL [ORC § 4301.82(C) and (F)]

- Not earlier than thirty (30) days but not later than sixty (60) days after the initial publication of notice, Council shall approve or disapprove the application by Ordinance
- Approval requires an affirmative vote of the majority of Council
- If the application is disapproved, the Mayor may make changes to the application to secure approval by Council
- At the time of approval, Council shall adopt an Ordinance that establishes all of the following:
 - The specific boundaries of the area, including street addresses
 - The number, spacing, and type of signage designating the area
 - The hours of operation for the area
 - Safety Plan setting forth the number of personnel needed to ensure public safety
 - Sanitation Plan that will help maintain the appearance and public health of the area
 - Requirement that beer and intoxicating liquor be served in plastic bottles or approved non-glass container
- Meeting Schedule
 - First Read: April 28, 2025
 - Second Read and Public Hearing: May 12, 2025
 - Third Read and Approval/Disapproval: May 26, 2025
 - Effective Date (If Approved): June 26, 2025 (Unless Council elects to pass as an emergency)

STEP FOUR → DIVISION OF LIQUOR CONTROL [ORC § 4301.82(C) and (E)]

- City Council shall provide notice of approval to the Division of Liquor Control and the investigative unit of the Department of Public Safety
- Notice shall include a description of the area, Safety Plan, and Sanitation Plan

This legislation establishes an independent contract agreement for 90 days and will take effect on April 1, 2025, for the engagement of Sandra Boller as an independent contractor to provide expert advice on recruitment and retention for the City of Reynoldsburg.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH AN INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

WHEREAS, the City of Reynoldsburg has negotiated an agreement with Sandra Boller to establish an independent contract agreement for ninety days beginning April 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the engagement of this independent contractor to provide expert advice on recruitment and retention; and

WHEREAS, the agreement will reimburse said contractor for an amount not to exceed \$30,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REYNOLDSBURG, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor be and is hereby authorized to execute an agreement with independent contractor Sandra Boller for ninety days beginning April 1, 2025.

SECTION 2. That the amount of this contract is not to exceed \$30,000.00 and will be paid from account number 110.582.5399 Miscellaneous Contract Services.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon passage by Council and the signature of the Mayor.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

This Independent Contractor Agreement (this "Agreement") is entered into as of April 1, 2025 (the "Effective Date"), by and between the City of Reynoldsburg, Ohio (the "City") and Sandra Boller (the "Contractor"). The City and the Contractor are referred to herein individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties." For and in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. NATURE OF SERVICES.

The City hereby engages Contractor, and Contractor hereby accepts such engagement, as an Independent Contractor to provide consulting services to the City (the "Services"). the Services to be performed hereunder include remote consultation (computer and telephone-based communications) with the City's Human Resources Director regarding specific human resource project initiatives determined by the City and with which Contractor possesses significant experience and historical perspective (the "Projects"). Contractor agrees to be generally available during regular City working hours (Monday-Friday, 8:00AM-5:00PM) for the purpose of remote consultation and assistance with the Projects until their completion.

2. TERM.

The term of this Agreement (the "Term") shall commence on the Effective Date and continue for ninety (90) days or until terminated sooner in accordance with Section 6 of this Agreement.

3. CONSULTING FEE.

During the Term, Contractor shall be paid a Consulting Fee of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) at the end of each thirty (30) day period in which Contractor performs or is available to perform the Services. If Contractor elects to withdraw or is otherwise not available to perform the Services for any such thirty (30) day period or any portion thereof, the Consulting Fee paid shall be prorated to reflect the time during which Contractor was available to perform the Services. All payments made to Contractor shall be via direct deposit to an account identified by Contractor. The Parties understand and agree the City shall send the Contractor an IRS Form 1099 with respect to the Consulting Fee.

4. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES.

4.1 Contractor is an independent contractor, and this Agreement shall not be construed to create any association, partnership, joint venture, employee or agency relationship between Contractor and the City for any purpose. Contractor shall have no authority (and shall not hold herself out as having authority) to bind the City, and Contractor shall not make any agreements or representations on the City's behalf without the City's prior written consent.

4.2 Contractor, as an independent contractor, will not be eligible to participate in any vacation, group insurance, or retirement benefits, or any other fringe benefits or benefit plans offered by the City to its employees. Contractor is solely responsible to report and pay all

applicable taxes on the fees and compensation received pursuant to this Agreement, and Contractor agrees to and acknowledges the obligation to pay all self-employment and other taxes thereon, including applicable federal, state and local income taxes. All payments to Contractor shall be included on an IRS Form 1099 to Contractor.

4.3 Contractor shall be responsible for any and all expenses associated with the Services. Contractor understands and agrees that she is responsible for unemployment compensation and worker's compensation, and that the City will not provide and has no obligation to provide such benefits.

5. REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES.

5.1 Contractor represents and warrants to the City that:

(a) Contractor has the right to enter into this Agreement, to grant the rights granted herein and to perform fully all of Contractor's obligations in this Agreement;

(b) Contractor shall perform the Services in compliance with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations; and

(c) Contractor shall determine the method of accomplishing Contractor's Services. Contractor shall be free from the control and direction of the City in accomplishing the Services contracted herein.

5.2 The City hereby represents and warrants to Contractor that:

(a) It has the full right, powers and authority to enter into this Agreement and to perform its obligations hereunder; and

(b) The execution of this Agreement by its representative whose signature is set forth at the end hereof has been duly authorized to do so.

6. TERMINATION.

6.1 This Agreement shall terminate automatically upon completion of the Term or the Services, whichever occurs first.

6.2 Contractor may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the City. In the event of termination pursuant to this Paragraph, the City shall pay Contractor any prorated Fees then due and payable for any Services completed up to and including the date of such termination.

6.3 Either Party may immediately terminate this Agreement upon written notice if the other Party materially breaches any term or condition of this Agreement.

7. ASSIGNMENT.

Contractor shall not assign any rights, or delegate or subcontract any obligations under this Agreement without the City's prior written consent. Any assignment in violation of the foregoing shall be deemed null and void.

8. MISCELLANEOUS.

8.1 Governing Law; Interpretation. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio, including its choice of law provisions. Both Parties hereby consent and submit to the jurisdiction of the state and federal courts in Franklin County, Ohio, in all questions and controversies arising out of this Agreement.

8.2 Severability. If any one or more of the provisions of this Agreement, or the application thereof in any circumstance, is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect for any reason, the validity, legality and enforceability of any such provision in every other respect and the remaining provisions of this Agreement will be unimpaired, and this Agreement will continue in full force and effect, unless the provisions held invalid, illegal or unenforceable will substantially impair the benefits of the remaining provisions hereof.

8.3 Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Contractor and the City and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings, written or oral, concerning Contractor's Services to the City, the termination thereof, and all related matters. No modification, amendment or waiver of any of the provisions of this Agreement shall be effective unless made in writing specifically referring to this Agreement and duly signed by each Party hereto.

THE PARTIES HERETO have caused this Agreement to be executed by their duly authorized representatives as of the Effective Date.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND REYNOLDSBURG CODIFIED ORDINANCE SECTION 333.03
MAXIMUM SPEED LIMITS; ASSURED CLEAR DISTANCE AHEAD**

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Reynoldsburg recognizes that safety on the roadways is of paramount importance to the residents and visitors of the City; and

WHEREAS, excessive vehicular speed in sensitive areas of the City, such as residential streets and school speed zones, presents a specific and particular threat to the safety of the City's most vulnerable citizens - children; and

WHEREAS, this Council seeks to amend the speeding ordinance of the City to reflect the priorities of this community to promote the safety of our public roadways and, more specifically, our young people; and

WHEREAS, increased penalties for excessive speed in sensitive areas of the City will operate as a further deterrent to such unsafe driving.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
REYNOLDSBURG:**

Section 1. That Section 333.03 Maximum Speed Limits; Assured Clear Distance Ahead of the Codified Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg shall be amended as set forth in the attached Exhibit A.

Section 2. That upon passage by Council, this Ordinance shall be effective thirty days following the signature of the Mayor.

333.03 MAXIMUM SPEED LIMITS; ASSURED CLEAR DISTANCE AHEAD.

(a) No person shall operate a motor vehicle at a speed greater or less than is reasonable or proper, having due regard for the traffic, surface, and width of the street or highway and any other conditions, and no person shall drive any motor vehicle in and upon any street or highway at a greater speed than will permit him or her to bring it to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

(b) It is prima facie lawful, in the absence of a lower limit declared or established pursuant to this section by the Director of Transportation or local authorities, for the operator of a motor vehicle to operate the same at a speed not exceeding the following:

(1) A. Twenty miles per hour in school zones during school recess and while children are going to or leaving school during the opening or closing hours, and when 20 miles per hour school speed limit signs are erected, except that on controlled-access highways and expressways, if the right-of-way line fence has been erected without pedestrian opening, the speed shall be governed by division (b)(4) of this section, and on freeways, if the right-of-way line fence has been erected without pedestrian opening, the speed shall be governed by divisions (b)(10) and (b)(11) of this section. The end of every school zone may be marked by a sign indicating the end of the zone. Nothing in this section or in the Manual and Specifications for a Uniform System of Traffic-Control Devices shall be construed to require school zones to be indicated by signs equipped with flashing or other lights, or giving other special notice of the hours in which the school zone speed limit is in effect.

B. As used in this section, “school” means all of the following:

1. Any school chartered under R.C. § 3301.16;
2. Any nonchartered school that during the preceding year filed with the Department of Education in compliance with O.A.C. 3301-35-08, a copy of the school’s report for the parents of the school’s pupils certifying that the school meets state minimum standards for nonchartered, nontax-supported schools and presents evidence of this filing to the jurisdiction from which it is requesting the establishment of a school zone;
3. Any special elementary school that in writing requests the County Engineer to create a school zone at the location of the school. Upon receipt of the written request, the County Engineer shall create a school zone at that location by erecting appropriate signs;
4. Any preschool education program operated by an educational service center that is located on a street or highway with a speed limit of 45 miles per hour or more, when the educational service center in writing requests that the County Engineer create a school zone at the location of that program. Upon receipt of such a written request, the County Engineer shall create a school zone at that location by erecting the appropriate signs.

C. As used in this section, “school zone” means that portion of a street or highway passing a school fronting upon the street or highway that is encompassed by projecting the school property lines to the fronting street or highway, and also includes that portion of a State highway. Upon request from local authorities for streets and highways under their jurisdiction and that portion of a State highway under the jurisdiction of the Director of Transportation or a request from a County

Engineer in the case of a school zone for a special elementary school, the Director may extend the traditional school zone boundaries. The distances in divisions (b)(1)C.1. through 3. below shall not exceed 300 feet per approach per direction, and are bounded by whichever of the following distances or combination thereof the Director approves as most appropriate:

1. The distance encompassed by projecting the school building lines normal to the fronting highway and extending a distance of 300 feet on each approach direction;

2. The distance encompassed by projecting the school property lines intersecting the fronting highway and extending a distance of 300 feet on each approach direction;

3. The distance encompassed by the special marking of the pavement for a principal school pupil crosswalk plus a distance of 300 feet on each approach direction of the highway.

D. Nothing in this section shall be construed to invalidate the Director's initial action on August 9, 1976, establishing all school zones at the traditional school zone boundaries defined by projecting school property lines, except when those boundaries are extended as provided in divisions (b)(1)A. and (b)(1)C. of this section.

E. As used in this division, "crosswalk" has the meaning given that term in Ohio R.C. 4511.01(LL)(2).

F. The Director may, upon request by resolution of the Legislative Authority and upon submission by the Municipality of such engineering, traffic, and other information as the Director considers necessary, designate a school zone on any portion of a State route lying within the Municipality that includes a crosswalk customarily used by children going to or leaving a school during recess and opening and closing hours, whenever the distance, as measured in a straight line, from the school property line nearest the crosswalk to the nearest point of a crosswalk is no more than 1,320 feet. Such a school zone shall include the distance encompassed by the crosswalk and extending 300 feet in each appropriate direction of the State route.

G. As used in this section, "special elementary school" means a school that meets all of the following:

1. It is not chartered and does not receive tax revenue from any source.
2. It does not educate children beyond the eighth grade.
3. It is located outside the limits of a municipal corporation.
4. A majority of the total number of students enrolled at the school are not related by blood.

5. The principal or other person in charge of the special elementary school annually sends a report to the superintendent of the school district in which the special elementary school is located indicating the total number of students enrolled at the school, but otherwise the principal or other person in charge does not report any other information or data to the superintendent.

(2) Twenty-five miles per hour in all other portions of the Municipality, except on state routes outside business districts, through highways outside business districts, and alleys;

(3) Thirty-five miles per hour on all state routes or through highways within the Municipality outside business districts, except as provided in divisions (b)(4) and (6) of this section;

(4) Fifty miles per hour on controlled-access highways and expressways within the municipality, except as provided in divisions (b)(12), (b)(13), (b)(14), (b)(15), and (b)(16) of this section;

(5) Fifty-five miles per hour on highways outside the municipality, other than highways within island jurisdictions as provided in division (b)(8) of this section, highways as provided in divisions (b)(9) and (b)(10) of this section, and highways, expressways and freeways as provided in divisions (b)(12), (b)(13), (b)(14), and (b)(16) of this section;

(6) Fifty miles per hour on state routes within the municipality outside urban districts unless a lower prima facie speed is established as further provided in this section;

(7) Fifteen miles per hour on all alleys within the municipality;

(8) Thirty-five miles per hour on highways outside the municipality that are within an island jurisdiction;

(9) Thirty-five miles per hour on through highways, except state routes, that are outside municipal corporations and that are within a national park with boundaries extending through two or more counties;

(10) Sixty miles per hour on two-lane state routes outside municipal corporations as established by the Director under Ohio R.C. 4511.21(H)(2);

(11) Fifty-five miles per hour on freeways with paved shoulders inside the municipality, other than freeways as provided in divisions (b)(14) and (b)(16) of this section;

(12) Sixty miles per hour on rural expressways with traffic control signals and on all portions of rural divided highways, except as provided in divisions (b)(13) and (b)(14) of this section;

(13) Sixty-five miles per hour on all rural expressways without traffic control signals;

(14) Seventy miles per hour on all rural freeways;

(15) Fifty-five miles per hour on all portions of freeways or expressways in congested areas as determined by the Director and that are located within a municipal corporation or within an interstate freeway outerbelt, except as provided in division (b)(16) of this section;

(16) Sixty-five miles per hour on all portions of freeways or expressways without traffic control signals in urbanized areas.

(c) It is prima facie unlawful for any person to exceed any of the speed limitations in divisions (b)(1)A., (b)(2), (b)(3), (b)(4), (b)(6), (b)(7), (b)(8) and (b)(9) of this section or any declared or established pursuant to this section by the Director or local authorities and it is unlawful for any person to exceed any of the speed limitations in division (d) of this section. No person shall be convicted of more than one violation of this section for the same conduct, although violations of more than one provision of this section may be charged in the alternative in a single affidavit.

(d) No person shall operate a motor vehicle upon a street or highway as follows:

(1) At a speed exceeding 55 miles per hour, except upon a two-lane state route as provided in division (b)(10) of this section and upon a highway, expressway or freeway as provided in divisions (b)(12), (b)(13), (b)(14), and (b)(16) of this section;

(2) At a speed exceeding 60 miles per hour upon a two-lane state route as provided in division (b)(10) of this section and upon a highway as provided in division (b)(12) of this section;

(3) At a speed exceeding 65 miles per hour upon an expressway as provided in division (b)(13) of this section or upon a freeway as provided in division (b)(16) of this section, except upon a freeway as provided in division (b)(14) of this section;

(4) At a speed exceeding 70 miles per hour upon a freeway as provided in division (b)(14) of this section;

(5) At a speed exceeding the posted speed limit upon a highway, expressway or freeway for which the Director has determined and declared a speed limit pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4511.21(I)(2) or (L)(2).

(e) Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4511.21(E), in every charge of violating this section, the affidavit and warrant shall specify the time, place and speed at which the defendant is alleged to have driven, and in charges made in reliance upon division (c) of this section also the speed which division (b)(1)A., (b)(2), (b)(3), (b)(4), (b)(6), (b)(7), (b)(8) or (b)(9) of, or a limit declared or established pursuant to, this section or Ohio R.C. 4511.21 declares is prima facie lawful at the time and place of such alleged violation, except that in affidavits where a person is alleged to have driven at a greater speed than will permit the person him or her to bring the vehicle to stop within the assured clear distance ahead, the affidavit and warrant need not specify the speed at which the defendant is alleged to have driven.

(f) Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4511.21(F), when a speed in excess of both a prima facie limitation and a limitation in division (d) of this section is alleged, the defendant shall be charged in a single affidavit, alleging a single act, with a violation indicated of both division (b)(1)A., (b)(2), (b)(3), (b)(4), (b)(6), (b)(7), (b)(8) or (b)(9) of this section, or of a limit declared or established pursuant to this section or Ohio R.C. 4511.21 by the Director or local authorities, and of the limitation in division (d) of this section. If the court finds a violation of division (b)(1)A., (b)(2), (b)(3), (b)(4), (b)(6), (b)(7), (b)(8) or (b)(9), or a limit declared or established pursuant to this section or Ohio R.C. 4511.21 has occurred, it shall enter judgment of conviction under such division and dismiss the charge under division (d) of this section. If it finds no violation of division (b)(1)A., (b)(2), (b)(3), (b)(4), (b)(6), (b)(7), (b)(8) or (b)(9) of this section, or a limit declared or established pursuant to, this section or Ohio R.C. 4511.21, it shall then consider whether the evidence supports a conviction under division (d) of this section.

(g) Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4511.21(G), points shall be assessed for a violation of a limitation under division (d) of this section in accordance with Ohio R.C. 4510.036.

(h) Whenever, in accordance with Ohio R.C. 4511.21(H) through (N), the maximum prima facie speed limitations as established herein have been altered, either higher or lower, and the appropriate signs giving notice have been erected as required, operators of motor vehicles shall be

governed by the speed limitations set forth on such signs. It is prima facie unlawful for any person to exceed the speed limits posted upon such signs.

(i) As used in this section:

(1) “Commercial bus.” A motor vehicle designed for carrying more than nine passengers and used for the transportation of persons for compensation.

(2) “Divided.” Means a roadway having two or more travel lanes for vehicles moving in opposite directions and that is separated by a median of more than four feet, excluding turn lanes.

(3) “Interstate system.” Has the same meaning as in 23 U.S.C. 101.

(4) “Noncommercial bus.” Includes but is not limited to a school bus, or a motor vehicle operated solely for the transportation of persons associated with a charitable or nonprofit organization.

(5) “Outerbelt.” A portion of a freeway that is part of the interstate system and is located in the outer vicinity of a major municipal corporation or group of municipal corporations, as designated by the Director.

(6) “Rural.” Means an area outside urbanized areas and outside of a business or urban district, and areas that extend within urbanized areas where the roadway characteristics remain mostly unchanged from those outside the urbanized areas.

(7) “Urbanized area.” Has the same meaning as in 23 U.S.C. § 101.

(j) Penalty.

(1) A violation of any provision of this section is one of the following:

A. Except as otherwise provided in divisions (j)(1)B., (j)(1) C., and (j)(2) and (j)(3) of this section, a minor misdemeanor;

B. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to two violations of any provision of this section, Ohio R.C. 4511.21, or any provision of any other municipal ordinance that is substantially equivalent to any provision of that section, a misdemeanor of the fourth degree;

C. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to three or more violations of any provision of this section, Ohio R.C. 4511.21, or any provision of any other municipal ordinance that is substantially equivalent to any provision of that section, a misdemeanor of the third degree.

(2) If the offender has not previously been convicted of or pleaded guilty to a violation of any provision of this section, Ohio R.C. 4511.21, or any other municipal ordinance that is substantially equivalent to any provision of that section, and operated a motor vehicle ~~faster than 35 miles an hour in a business district of the municipality~~, faster than 50 miles an hour in ~~other~~ portions of the municipality in which the posted speed limit is 35 miles an hour, 40 miles an hour in portions of the municipality in which the posted speed limit is 25 miles an hour, or faster than 35 miles an

hour in a school zone during recess or while children are going to or leaving school during the school's opening or closing hours, a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.

(3) Notwithstanding division (j)(1) of this section, if the offender operated a motor vehicle in a construction zone where a sign was then posted in accordance with Ohio R.C. 4511.98, the court, in addition to all other penalties provided by law, shall impose upon the offender a fine of two times the usual amount imposed for the violation. No court shall impose a fine of two times the usual amount imposed for the violation upon an offender if the offender alleges, in an affidavit filed with the court prior to the offender's sentencing, that the offender is indigent and is unable to pay the fine imposed pursuant to this division and if the court determines that the offender is an indigent person and unable to pay the fine.

(4) If the offender commits the offense while distracted and the distracting activity is a contributing factor to the commission of the offense, the offender is subject to the additional fine established under § 303.99(b).
