April 13, 2026**

CALL TO ORDER

Council President Bhuwan Pyakurel called the meeting to order at 6:30 PM.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Regular Meeting Minutes of March 23, 2026

The regular meeting minutes of March 23, 2026, were approved as submitted.

COMMUNITY COMMENTS

Council Comments

President Pyakurel

President Pyakurel stated that domestic violence and suicide are always difficult topics to discuss, but these issues were on the rise in Reynoldsburg. He stated that within the last 20 days, Reynoldsburg lost three individuals to suicide. He explained that he was involved in each situation and it was very painful. President Pyakurel stated that last month was suicide awareness month, but he felt as though there was more that could be done. He explained that he was not exactly sure what to do, but did not want to see our community lose more loved ones.

Mayoral Comments

Mayor Begeny

Mayor Begeny stated that Waggoner Road Phase 1 paving would start tomorrow, April

14th. This will take approximately ten or twelve days to complete. Construction on the multipurpose path would begin in May. In addition, they will be working on installing streetlights and the traffic lights. Staff was still determining when the road would reopen. There were some details about the median work that needed to be decided before opening the entire area. Waggoner Road Phase 2 preliminary planning and scheduling was underway. The main concern was providing access to Waggoner Road Elementary and Waggoner Road Junior High, as there was only one way in and one way out. They were working to complete most of the construction between Memorial Day and August. The 2026 Street Improvement Project was also underway with information available on the City's website. Engineering for the sidewalk program between Taylor Road and Hansen Street was also underway. City Hall improvements, which included changes to Council Chambers and other offices, were being scheduled. New businesses were moving into the Trivium Building, including a photography business. The Field House, on the land next to Central Ohio Primary Care, was waiting for the final plan for a shared parking lot. Community Clean-Up Day is April 25th from 9am to noon. The City of Reynoldsburg Night at the Columbus Clippers was on Saturday, May 23rd at 7:05pm. That night was also a fireworks night and Star Wars night.

Recognition of Community Volunteers

Mayor Begeny stated that in January, our community experienced an unexpected amount of snow. He wanted to thank the community members who stepped up to clear driveways and sidewalks for those not able to do it themselves. Mayor Begeny read the Proclamation.

Presentation by Ryan Lippe, Consumer Educator, with the Ohio Attorney General's Office

Mr. Ryan Lippe, Consumer Educator – Consumer Protection Section, from the Ohio Attorney General's Office, explained he educated consumers on how to prevent becoming a victim of a scam, how to prevent identity theft, how to implement good cybersecurity, and consumer law. The Attorney General's Office also supported local law enforcement. He stated that there were about twenty-five state laws designed to protect the consumer and outlined transactions. They also deal with consumer complaints. Those complaints became a public record, which can be found on the Attorney General's website. The State had around 29,000 complaints in 2025. Most complaints pertained to motor vehicles, professional services, shopping/food and beverages, home improvement, collections and credit reporting, and utilities, phone, and internet services. Red flags of a scam include: requests for payment by transfer, prepaid money cards, gift cards, cryptocurrency, or peer-to-peer payment networks (Venmo, Zelle, etc.), requesting personal information, pressuring you to act immediately, and requesting conversations be

kept secret. Mr. Lippe stated that one way to be proactive in protecting yourself was to review your credit report and credit score frequently to ensure that your identity was not compromised and affecting your credit. Consumers can reduce their risk of identity theft by shredding documents with personal information, watching for scams, monitoring your credit score, updating computer software, don't volunteer information, monitoring financial statements, and placing credit alerts or freezes on your credit report. The Attorney General's office also provides services to assist with these issues. The Attorney General's Office were on Facebook, X, and their website OhioProtects.org specifically for Ohio consumer protection. He thanked the Council President and Clerk of Council for allowing him to make this presentation.

Councilmember Chambers asked if the credit freeze affected your credit score. Mr. Lippe stated that no, it would not affect your score and was no cost. You were also able to freeze and unfreeze as often as you want using the three credit service websites — Equifax, TransUnion, and Experian.

President Pyakurel stated that this Proclamation was in recognition of Mayor Begeny for receiving the George Meany Award. Councilmember Towns read the Proclamation.

Councilmember Baker congratulated Mayor Begeny on receiving this award and stated that it was reflective of him and our community.

Councilmember Abram also congratulated Mayor Begeny, stating how much she appreciated working with him. Councilmember Chambers agreed with this statement.

Councilmember Baker made a motion to approve this Proclamation. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

Public Safety, Law & Courts Committee

Work Session

An Ordinance to Establish Section 705 Prohibiting Short-Term Rentals of the Codified Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg

This item has been brought to the Committee as a work session.

Assistant City Attorney Triplett stated that their office as well as the Mayor's office have noticed an increase in complaints and calls for service from Airbnb's in Reynoldsburg. There are no current City or State laws regulating Airbnb or short-term rentals. As of right now, any individual is able to own and operate a short-term rental in Reynoldsburg. The goal of this work session is to make Council aware of these issues and discuss potential options for the future. Some of the common issues they have seen include noise complaints, occupancy violations, and incidents of crime. Some of the issues they have seen specifically in Reynoldsburg include large house parties and noise complaints. She explained that some of these houses are even being listed as "party houses" on the website on which they are listed. Attorney Triplett stated that on March 15th, RPD responded to an Airbnb that was known to them for reports of shots fired. She explained that in the report the officer noted that the night before they had responded to a party at the same address that had over 200 people. This situation involved shooting from two groups both inside and outside the house, and a juvenile being robbed at gunpoint. Another situation was in late 2024 when multiple 911 calls were made about large groups of people fighting in the street outside an Airbnb. This party involved drugs, alcohol, and large groups of juveniles as well as significant damage to the property.

Attorney Triplett stated that she wanted to discuss different options for managing these short-term rentals and what other Central Ohio municipalities have chosen to implement. Most of these regulations generally define short-term rentals as less than 30 days and include a fee or registration system. Hilliard prohibits large social gatherings at short-term rentals as well, while Dublin has more in-depth legislation for short-term rentals. Some places have completely eliminated short-term rentals from their City. She is asking Council to consider what options they would like to see for short-term rentals in Reynoldsburg.

Councilmember Johnson asked how many Airbnbs or other short-term rentals there are in the City at this time. Attorney Triplett stated that through her preliminary research on Airbnb or VRBO, there were around nine or ten currently. She also

stated that the draft legislation of a complete ban she included with the packet is just an example, and they are able to create legislation in whichever way Council prefers. Councilmember Johnson stated that banning it was not her first thought about this, but she does think there should be some regulations surrounding short-term rentals.

Councilmember Abram asked how long they have had these AirBnBs in the community. Attorney Triplett stated that she is not sure how long they have been in the City, but they have noticed an increase in concerns and incidents at these locations recently. Councilmember Abram stated that out of the nine or ten rentals currently, it seems that there have only been issues at three or four of them. She asked if there had been reports at any of the other properties as well. Attorney Triplett stated that they do not have reports for every property but some of the reports are as small as noise complaints. Councilmember Abram stated that she would like to consider something outside a complete ban because we do have events like the Tomato Festival that people may want to travel to the City for. Councilmember Abram also stated that currently there are no limits on how many people someone can have at their residence for a gathering and no need for a permit. Attorney Shook stated that that is true, but there are occupancy limits in the single-family homes in Reynoldsburg. He stated that if a person wanted to throw a party at their own home there are no regulations on that. The only difference is that the owner of the property is typically there in a single-family residence rather than an Airbnb. Councilmember Abram stated that she has stayed at Airbnb's for weddings and funerals and does not want to completely get rid of that as an option in Reynoldsburg. Councilmember Abram asked if the Council had decided to move forward with a registration program, should Council decide what the fee was or if there was a recommendation. Attorney Triplett stated that they do not have a specific recommendation at this time. Councilmember Abram also asked if there is increased insurance for these properties. Attorney Triplett stated that the hosts create agreements through whatever website they choose to list their home on. Attorney Shook stated that they could require it within the Ordinance if that is the direction Council wanted to go.

Councilmember Salvati stated that he sees the value of short-term rentals within Reynoldsburg. He explained that he sees more value in having a minimum stay rather than a maximum to avoid issues like renting for one or two nights just to have a party. Attorney Triplett stated that there are jurisdictions that have minimum stays, so that is an option. Councilmember Salvati stated that he would like to see a permit program implemented with the option to revoke the permit if needed. He would also prefer that the rental home also be the owner's residence for at least part of the year rather than a property that is only there for the purpose of being rented out. He reiterated that he would not be in favor of banning them completely.

Councilmember Chambers stated that she agreed that she was not in favor of a complete ban, she saw the value of these short-term rentals within our City. Her daughter attended a graduation party at an Airbnb that had to end early because of threats of violence, so she does think there should be more regulation. She was in favor of a permit or registration system, residence verification, and did not see the need for time restrictions. She would also support the permit having the ability to be revoked as well as a monetary fine if there were continued issues.

Councilmember Hill stated that she would support a minimum stay of around three to four nights. She asked how this would be enforced and who would be in charge of that. Attorney Triplett stated that enforcement is one of the reasons some jurisdictions have chosen to go with a complete ban because regulation enforcement does create more questions and possible issues. Councilmember Hill stated that she was open to different options and was not opposed to a complete ban.

President Pyakurel stated that he was not in favor of any minimum stay, but he does support some kind of permit or regulation system. He asked what kind of calls were received from these properties and what area the properties were generally in. He also explained that he has many questions about enforcement. Attorney Triplett stated that if Council would like to see more statistics about these properties, they were happy to gather that information and send it to them. She also explained that enforcement would have to be tailored to whatever the ordinance is they choose to go with. They would like to be more proactive in these situations rather than reactive to these possibly dangerous situations.

Councilmember Baker stated that he was not for a total ban but does think that owners should have to take responsibility for what may happen there. He also would prefer that these rentals be privately owned rather than bought out by companies. Councilmember Baker stated that he understood that some people do earn extra income through these properties. He did not want to hinder that, but the City should better understand the risks that come with owning a short-term rental. He supported a five-day minimum stay and a \$1000 penalty fee, if needed.

Councilmember Towns thanked Attorney Triplett for all this information and stated that she also did not support a total ban. She stated that Columbus seemed to have good regulations in place, but she did have questions about how those would be enforced.

Councilmember Johnson reiterated that it seems as though there was an interest in a minimum stay, a registration process, and property owner responsibility. She asked if they would be able to bring something back to the first meeting in May to have further discussion. Attorney Shook asked that they work with Councilmember

Johnson on this legislation and then bring it back for another work session at the first meeting in May. Councilmember Johnson thanked them for presenting this information.

Public Service & Transportation Committee

This is the Public Service & Transportation Committee meeting for April 13, 2026.

An Ordinance to Repeal/Replace Ordinance No. 08-2026 an Ordinance

Authorizing the Mayor to Enter into a Contract with JLD Construction Services, LLC for the City of Reynoldsburg Parks and Public Service Access Road Project, Appropriating Funds Therefor, and Declaring an Emergency

This Ordinance has returned to Council to correct the funding appropriation language and approve as a single-read emergency.

Director Dorman stated that as Clerk Prasher stated earlier, these Ordinances will now have cleaned up language and comply with the new processes being put in place.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading and emergency approval. Second by Councilmember Chambers. Motion carried.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 949 Water Regulations of the Codified Ordinances for the City of Reynoldsburg, Ohio

Director Dorman stated that the City buys water meters from a company and each year these prices continue to go up. He explained that they do have a good number of water meters in stock currently, but they anticipate they will begin to run low around July.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Purchase Two Ford Mavericks and Related Equipment for the Reynoldsburg Building and Code Enforcement Department and Waive Competitive Bidding

Director Dorman stated that the purchase of these two Ford Mavericks would be through a community grant we have through NOPEC. Some of the regulations in the grant state that it has to be used for purchasing of EV equipment or vehicles and these trucks do qualify. These trucks will be used mostly be code enforcement.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Purchase the Rights-of-Way Necessary for the Construction of Waggoner Road Phase II, Appropriate Funds Therefor, and Declaring an Emergency

Director Dorman stated that similar to phase 1, there is a certain amount of funds that are set aside for the purchase of necessary rights-of-way needed for these

projects to be completed. The amount they have been authorized for is the amount that was requested in the grant. They are working with property owners at this time to come to a mutual agreement.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Chambers. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Authorizing the Mayor to Enter into a Contract with EMH&T for Professional Engineering Services Pertaining to the Evaluation of the City's Water Distribution System

Director Dorman stated that every year they like to find ways to improve the City's water distribution system infrastructure. They would like to have a better map of these lines and are requesting that this system be evaluated by EMH&T.

Councilmember Hill asked what the current process is for notifying residents if their water is going to be out or experiencing other issues. Director Dorman stated that right now the process is just knocking on doors. He stated that they would like to create a text system to alert residents of possible issues.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Purchase a Ford F-450 Truck and Related Equipment for the Stormwater Department and Waive Competitive Bidding

Director Dorman stated that they have one truck that has aged well beyond the recommended life span. This new F-450 would replace the current vehicle and then be listed for sale on GovDeals. They are waiving competitive bidding because it is below the bidding threshold.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to forward this Resolution to Council for approval. Second by Councilmember Towns. Motion carried.

Finance & Administration Committee

This is the Finance & Administration Committee meeting for April 13, 2026.

Members in attendance are: Councilmember Hill, Councilmember Johnson, Councilmember Salvati, Chair Baker, and President Pyakurel.

An Ordinance to Amend the Personnel Procedure Manual Regarding Inclement Weather, Short-Term and Long-Term Disability, and Fleet Safety

Director Cornell stated that they have refined the language to provide better clarification to employees regarding inclement weather, short and long term disability, and fleet safety.

Councilmember Baker made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 160, Section 160.02 Authorized Positions, Personnel, Classification and Pay Grade and Section 160.03(b) Supervisory Pay Range

Director Cornell stated that they also refined the language in the Chapter 160 to provide better clarification to employees, and they are adding a Permit Tech to the building department.

Councilmember Baker made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Johnson. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance and Sale of Notes in the Maximum Principal Amount of \$1,550,000, in Anticipation of the Issuance of Bonds, for the Purpose of Paying the Costs of Improving the Municipal Waterworks System, and Declaring an Emergency

Mayor Begeny stated that this legislation was related to the earlier discussion securing bonds for the Waggoner Road Phase 2, the Parks/Service building, and the Summit Road waterline. He explained the notes were similar, but had different requirements. After discussing the issue with Baker Tilly and the Auditor, it was determined as the most advantageous option for the City. This legislation requested \$1.5 million to cover the cost of the waterline work on Summit Road to connect the new development opportunities into the main waterline. Mayor Begeny clarified that the note would allow for greater fund security, because it had a higher minimum purchase amount.

Councilmember Baker made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Salvati. Motion carried.

An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance and Sale of Notes in the Maximum Principal Amount of \$13,910,000, in Anticipation of the Issuance of Bonds, for the Purpose of Paying the Costs of Improving the Municipal Vehicular Transportation System, and Declaring an Emergency

Mayor Begeny stated that this legislation was the same as the previous Ordinance, but specifically for funding Waggoner Road Phase 2 as well as the Park/Service building roadway. This cost was significantly lower due to grants and other funding

sources.

Councilmember Baker made a motion to forward this Ordinance to Council for a first reading. Second by Councilmember Salvati. Motion carried.
